Call for Volunteer Examiners - The BARC VE Team

BARC could use some more Volunteer Examiners (VEs) for our exam sessions. Recently we had to scramble again to get the required three VEs for an exam session. If any unforeseen situation arises and a VE is not able to make a session we would be forced to cancel the test.

There are some BARC members who are qualified VEs that have not been participating in the testing. We urge these VEs to become active. If you can spare one night every couple of months please come to a session.

We can also surely use additional VEs. The test procedure for qualification is simple. Materials are available from the ARRL and the examination is an open book test. Hams with General and Amateur Extra class licenses are eligible to become VEs, though only Extras can administer tests for General and Amateur Extra licenses. January 2017 Repeater Update – Joe Harris, N1QD

I am pleased to report that the 145.23 repeater has now been restored to full health! In early December Joe, N1QD, and Mark, KB1EKN, restored the club's 6-cavity VHF duplexer and added an additional bandpass filter on the repeater's receiver input.

The results have been impressive! Users have been checking in to the repeater from southern New Hampshire, southeastern Massachusetts, and other far-off locations! The activity on the repeater has seen a dramatic uptick in the past few weeks. Check-ins on the Monday night net are increasing, and the Eastern MA 2 Meter Traffic Net has returned to 145.23 for their daily 8 p.m. traffic net.

As of now, BARC has two fully-functioning repeaters in good health. 145.23 remains the club's flagship repeater, with a massive footprint in eastern Massachusetts. 449.175 is the club's UHF DMR repeater, which has now been on the air for almost a year now.

The sooner we have a full roster, the sooner we can shift our focus to the rest of the planning and organization that goes into the event. That will make a better event for everyone: the runners, the medical teams, and ourselves as volunteers too.

Thanks to all of our volunteers, past and present. I'm looking forward to a great 2017 Boston Marathon.

What do Those Questions on the Membership Application Mean? - Joe Chapman, NV1W

Sometimes membership applications come back with question marks or confused scribbles around some of the questions and checkboxes, so here is a handy guide.

ARRL Membership. I assume everyone knows what this means, but to be complete: we want to know whether you're a member of the American Radio Relay League (ARRL, or "The League"), and if so, whether you have a regular (annual) membership or a life membership. More information can be found at http://www.arrl.org.

Are you an ARRL certified VE? Check "yes" if you're a Volunteer Examiner (VE) certified by the ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator (VEC). See the article elsewhere in this issue of the SPARC for details. Note that there are several VECs; apart from the ARRL, the most common non-ARRL one is run by the W5YI group. All BARC VE sessions are run under the auspices of the ARRL.

Emcomm? These are the emergency communications classes offered by the ARRL. In the old days, there were three, hence the choice of 1, 2, and 3. They have recently been replaced by two: the introductory course (EC-001) and the emergency management course (EC-016). If you've taken EC-001, circle 1, if you've taken EC-016, circle 3.

EC-001 costs \$50. It's a combination of online learning and projects done under the supervision of a mentor. You have to complete the work in 9 weeks, and in my experience you have to keep at it so as not to fall behind—it's fairly common for people to drop out. More information can be found on the ARRL website.

EC-016 is more advanced and requires EC-001 as a prerequisite.

Have you taken ICS-700? This is a FEMA course, *IS-00700.a National Incident Management System (NIMS): An Introduction.* You can take it for free on-line, and there's a multiple-choice final exam at the end. My impression is that pretty much everyone in the post-Katrina world who wants to do emergency work has to take this course (it's a prerequisite for EC-001). Although the membership application doesn't ask about *IS-00100.b Introduction to the Incident Command System ICS-100,* it is the other essential FEMA course, also available for free on-line with a multiple-choice final exam at the end. See https://training.fema.gov/is/courseoverview.aspx?code=IS-100.b.

- Your current license and a photocopy for the ARRL, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid picture ID or two valid non-picture IDs
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
