Talk to the World on HF Using VHF/UHF

The FCC has recently authorized a new operating method that should be of interest to anyone with HF privileges – including some of the new Technicians. SkyCommand (its commercial name) allows HF operation from remote locations by using common 2-meter and 70-cm frequencies.

Eric, K1NUN, will describe and demonstrate the SkyCommand concept at our General meeting on 19 April. While the operation is easy to use, SkyCommand allows global communication through remote operation on HF frequencies. You can be at home or in the field and get on the HF bands. The remote base concept may be interesting for a station that can be shared by hams whose apartment or condo rules do not allow outside antennas, or by some who see the remote station concept for public service opportunities. This is an interesting and affordable way to get on HF at a small cost, or operate your "big rig" at home while you putter around the yard or take a drive.

Come to the April meeting to see Eric's SkyCommand demonstration and discuss the implications for BARC and yourself. The April General meeting starts at 7:30 pm. There will be ample time both before and after the meeting to socialize and get in some eyeball contacts.

The meeting will be held on 19 April, at 7:30 pm at the Newton Police HQ, 1321 Washington Street, West Newton, MA. There is ample nearby parking and the location is handicap accessible. Talk-in is available on 145.230 MHz [-] 88.5.

If you have any ideas about topics that you would like to see presented, please feel free to contact one of your officers and we will see what we can do to make it happen for you. Remember, this is **your club** and we are here to serve you.

The Boston Amateur Radio Club usually holds monthly VE sessions on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. A map is shown on page 7.

If the Brookline public schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be canceled.

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School Street from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif : for more info.

For those traveling via the **T**, take the "D" branch of the Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician thru Extra, CW and written). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- **\$14.00** (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

Bylaw Change Voted

The bylaw now reads:

The officers of The Club shall be elected at the June General meeting. <u>All</u> officers shall assume the duties of their offices on the first of the month following the election.

Instruction is provided to spotters to identify and report critical ground weather information to NWS. SKYWARN is supported by a wellorganized ham radio activity. Hams play an important role in these observations, however, it is not necessary to be an Amateur Radio operator to take this valuable training.

Code practice texts are from *QST*, and the source of each practice is given at the beginning of each practice and at the beginning of alternate speeds.

On Tuesdays and Fridays at 2230 UTC, Keplerian Elements for active amateur satellites are sent on the regular teleprinter frequencies.

A DX bulletin replaces or is added to the regular bulletins between 0000 UTC Thursdays and 0000 UTC Fridays.

In a communications emergency, monitor W1AW for special bulletins as follows: Voice on the hour, Teleprinter at 15 minutes past the hour, and CW on the half-hour.

Daily Visitor Operating Hours: 1500 UTC to 1700 UTC 1800 UTC to 2045 UTC


FCC licensed amateurs may operate the station from 1400 UTC to 1600 UTC, and then from 1700 UTC to 1945 UTC, Monday through Friday. The station is closed 1700 to 1800 UTC. Be sure to bring your current FCC amateur license or a photocopy.


