MS Walks a Radio Success

"This event could not have happened without you." So wrote the MS Society Coordinator of Volunteers, referring to the ham radio support for two of their walks on Sunday, 29 April. The Multiple Sclerosis Society had two concurrent events on 29 April: one, the usual Boston Walk from near Harvard Stadium, around the river and back. We established a single Net Control at Harvard and monitored the safety and support of all the walkers as they raised a generous lot of money for research.

Run of the Charles Paddled Smoothly

SKYWARN is a program sponsored by the National Weather Service (NWS) to increase information regarding surface weather conditions during critical weather events. Instruction is provided to spotters to identify and report critical ground weather information to NWS. SKYWARN is supported by a well-organized ham radio activity. Hams play an important role in these observations, however, it is not necessary to be an Amateur Radio operator to take this valuable training.

Why My SkyCommand Demonstration Failed at the April General Meeting

or

Don't You Just Hate It When Things Go Right?

So, there you were at the April General meeting when I showed off the SkyCommand system. You saw I could change the HF rig's frequency and mode. A different radio could use it, but you did not see the UHF signal get transmitted to HF, nor did you see an HF signal come back to the VHF receiver. Let me show you what went wrong. And right!

Using my dual-band HT, I could command the TS-2000 to do those things it is supposed to do - except for that final link of transmitting to HF. Well, duh, the obvious situation (only obvious when I got home and trouble-shot the system) was that I bumped the VFO knob off frequency, so the HT's signal was not heard by the '2000. All the right lights blinked, but the receiver was somewhere else. I adjusted that back again on the table. So much for that.

This also meant that the separate FT-817 radio could not hear the signal that was off frequency. So, it appeared that nothing was working on the HF side of the operation. But the frequency adjustment of the '2000 and the '817 corrected for that. Technically, that is.

But no! Something else was going right and we did not know it!

Recall that the TS-2000 and the FT-817 were both connected to dummy loads, for convenience and to avoid stringing real antenna wires. Think, now, what is the purpose of a dummy load? It represents a constant impedance across its range to a resonant circuit without radiating. Reread those last two words: "without radiating."

The HF signals transmitted by the TS-2000 could not be heard by the FT-817, even from only a few feet, because the dummy load was not radiating. In fact, the dummy on the '817 was so good, it prevented reception of nearby signals as well! This means the dummy loads (the '817's in particular) were doing their jobs. Had they been less efficient and effective, the demonstration would have appeared successful. But as it was, you'll have to take my word that it's working at my home again.

Don't you just hate it when you think something is wrong when something else is right? Just like Murphy to throw a sucker punch like that.

Orange Caps for Public Service Events

BARC has a supply of the bright orange caps for use at emergency or public service events. They are adjustable to fit all but the very largest heads, and proclaim, "Emergency Communications."


Field Day 2007 and BARC in General

Of what value is the club's participation in Field Day? Some say we gotta because tradition carries a lot of weight. Some say that as a contest it is of no interest. Some say that for an urban area, the use of HF for emergencies is impractical – that we would never be asked to set up such a station in the field. Some say the equipment is reliable enough not to justify the labor of setting up in bad weather. Then there is the problem of setting up and finding enough people to help tear down.

Bet you have a thought or two about some of the issues above. Field Day has been an annual, national event since the mid-1930s. It is promoted as a demonstration of emergency readiness operated as a contest, yet we may consider the logistical sense of our own form of readiness.

Tie these factors into the reason and progress of BARC. We are at the point of decision, not only of Field Day or not, but of positive direction for the club. We have strength and fortitude, but we may still need a compass. The May General meeting will be for listening to your ideas – good, bad, but not indifferent. Members, your help is vital to the existence of our club.

This discussion is open to all. The meeting will be on **Thursday**, **17 May starting at 1930** at the Newton Police HQ. Join in and help make the club work for you.



Update - Red Cross Background Checks

The position of the Red Cross is that ARES volunteers would not be permitted to provide communications at a disaster site for more than seven days without submitting to the Red Cross background check procedure. ARRL's stated concern was that the ARC background investigation consent form states that a consumer report and/or an investigative consumer report - which includes certain credit checks and includes mode of living checks - will be obtained on the volunteer signing the form.

The ARRL asked if the Red Cross would be willing to modify the consent form so that it limits the authority granted by the person signing the form to criminal background checks only. The Red Cross representatives did not indicate a willingness to modify the consent form.

ARRL reiterates its recommendation that members carefully review any consent document permitting a private organization to conduct a background investigation on that person. The current Red Cross background check consent form does include permission, without further consent from the volunteer, to conduct a consumer report and/or an investigative consumer report. The Federal Trade Commission and Federal statutes define investigative consumer reports as including a mode-of-living check as well as certain credit checks.

ARRL will not suggest what organizations or agencies should or should not be supported by volunteer Amateur Radio communications. ARRL does wish to facilitate the provision of volunteer services, however.

Any operator(s) who wish to go beyond that must supply their own complete station with the club's encouragement, but without planned club support. Certain club support may be available only by prior agreement.

The Bikes Ride Again - Hams Needed

After years of sponsoring bicycle rides to benefit youth bicycle programs, the Bikes Not Bombs organization of Boston realized the value of reliable communications. BARC has been asked to assist this event again this year. The date is **Sunday, 3 June**.

There are three concurrent ride courses - 15 mile, 25 mile, and 62 mile; each with separate rest stops and support vehicles. 200 riders are expected, and we are tasked with monitoring the rest stops, follow vehicles and a few shadows. New this year, all rides start in a park near the Stony Brook ${\bf T}$ Station (Orange Line). There will be no assignments on the streets.

The finish for all rides will again be at Mississippi's Restaurant where cars can be parked for the day in a secure lot. Transportation will be provided to the outlying rest stops, but you may proceed directly if you wish. The shorter courses should be finished by 1400 and the longest course should finish by 1630. The restaurant provides a gourmet dinner buffet in the afternoon. Note that our gourmand food testers have declared this feed to be superb.

- Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

Lightning Safety Preparedness

Lightning Safety Outdoors

Each year about 400 children and adults in the United States are struck by lightning. About 80 people are killed and several hundred more are left to cope with permanent disabilities. Many of these tragedies can be avoided.

Lightning often strikes as much as 20 miles away from any rainfall. At least 10% of lightning occurs without any visible clouds in the sky - just blue sky. Many lightning fatalities occur ahead of the storm. You are in danger if you can hear thunder. That means lightning is close enough that it could strike your location at any moment. On average, 20% of lightning strike victims die, 80% survive, but 70% of them suffer serious long-term effects.

Here are some lightning safety rules.

- 1. Postpone activities promptly and do not wait for the rain. Go quickly inside a completely enclosed building not a carport, open garage or covered patio. If no enclosed building is available, get inside a hard-topped metal vehicle. The steel frame of the vehicle provides protection if you are not touching metal.
- 2. Be the lowest point. Lightning likes to strike the tallest objects. In general however, you should avoid trees. If you are in an open field like a farm or on a baseball or soccer field you are the tallest object. If you cannot get to an enclosed building or vehicle, crouch down on the balls of your feet.
- 3. Keep an eye to the sky for darkening clouds and listen for thunder. If you can hear it go to a safe shelter immediately.
- 4. Get off bicycles and motorcycles. Do not lean on vehicles.
- 5. Water is a great conductor of electricity. Get out of the water and off the beach. Do not stand in puddles even if wearing rubber boots.
- 6. Avoid metal. Do not hold golf clubs, fishing rods, or tools. Large metal objects can conduct lightning. Small metal objects such as belt buckles can cause burns.
- 7. Stay several yards away from other people. Do not share a bleacher or bench or huddle in a group.

8. Listen to NOAA weather radio. First, to find out if thunderstorms are in the forecast. Next, listen to short term forecasts about thunderstorm activity, damaging winds and large hail in addition to lightning strikes.




