

BARC To Operate SKYWARN Recognition Day -- Mark Duff, KB1EKN

On Saturday, 1 December 2007, SKYWARN Recognition Day (SRD) will be held for the ninth straight year. SRD is an event where National Weather Service Forecast Offices get on the air and make contacts with other NWS Offices as well as all Amateurs and any Amateur Radio SKYWARN Spotters. The purpose is to thank the thousands of Amateur Radio SKYWARN Spotters whose timely reports of severe weather into NWS Forecast Offices across the country protect life and property.

BARC will participate for the fifth year from the Blue Hill Observatory in Milton. Operating hours will be from 0900 to 1500. Details will be in the November newsletter but mark your calendars now for a fun event.

Fun – you want some fun? How about an antenna held 200 feet aloft by a kite in 2004? Then there was the gale-force snowstorm in 2003. There are antennas to be installed and HF/VHF/UHF stations to be operated. We have the opportunity to meet with visitors to demonstrate and explain the relationship between weather observation and ham radio. All this at the weather station with the oldest continuous weather records in the country.

BARC Volunteer Exam Sessions

The Boston Amateur Radio Club usually holds monthly VE sessions on the second Monday of each month. **Because of the Sunday holiday, the November session will be omitted**. Sessions are usually held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. A map is shown on page 7.

If the Brookline Public Schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be canceled.

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School St from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif : for more info.

For those traveling via the T, take the "D" branch of the Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician, General, Extra, and CW). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- **\$14.00** (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

New Contesters – You Can Do Better

One of the most common questions I've heard from hams new to contesting is: What's the best way I can make more contacts in a contest?" The answer is simple: Call CQ.

Nothing brings more QSOs in the log faster than finding a frequency and calling "CQ Contest!" Scanning the bands looking for new stations, while very important, is time-consuming; the successful contester finds a balance between scanning the band looking for new QSOs or multipliers and having stations come to **them**. Casual stations not concerned with the time limit in a contest will scan the bands all day and night. This technique works no matter what your power level is; many a QRPer has held a frequency for a time and worked stations much faster this way.

If you're looking to take your contesting to the next level, find a frequency and call CQ; by making the casual stations come to **you**, you'll get more QSOs in your log, and improve your score.

Looking Ahead At Public Service


BARC QSO Cards -- Arthur Ashley, N1NHZ

Committee Reports -

Other Business -

A decision was reached by the Executive Committee to withdraw from the Marathon Amateur Radio Communications Consortium (MARC). Individual hams are encouraged to participate in the Boston Marathon ham support. Bob will send a message to MARC.

There was discussion about establishing an approval process for new member applications. Related information has been received from other clubs but it is inconclusive. The matter was tabled and will be brought up at the December Business meeting. Anyone with thoughts about this should attend.

The flyer for the 2007 Holiday Party was approved with a little modification from last year. Following the success last year, the party will be held again at the Stockyard Restaurant in Brighton. Members, their families and guests are invited. The club will cover the tax, gratuity and any differential charges. Individuals will be responsible for their own bar bills.

The November newsletter will need help for folding and related operations at the Cambridgeside Galleria Food Court.

Arthur suggested exploring how to arrange for a short-notice alternate net control for BARC-net when Joe, W1JJF, is not available.

Solutions include identifying qualified operators who could then be notified by Joe if he cannot be the net control. Another solution is for Arthur (or someone else) to open the net, take checkins and then ask for someone to take over as net control. Arthur will write the simple procedure for continuing the net.

To attract more hams to our meetings, Arthur suggested posting the next General meeting topic on barc-list. Eric suggested an article in the newsletter reviewing the past General meeting presentation, and also post it on barc-list.

We agreed to renew our club listing in World Radio for \$70.

Eric, with Phil, agreed to look into a simple antenna building project for a General meeting topic. At club expense, members could assemble a 2-meter portable J-pole antenna using 300 ohm twin-lead.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2130.




