We lost a good friend and supportive ham when Dick Doherty, KA1TUZ, died last month. He was one of the very earliest members of BARC. Following are just some of the many remembrances and anecdotes that have flooded in following the announcement of his passing.

Dick was easy going and offered help to all who needed guidance, whether it was packet radio, antenna installation or travel routing. He had some life altering injuries that perhaps made him more sympathetic to others who needed an assist. His love for ham radio served him well, but not selfishly. He turned that human interest into human service and spent years coming to the rescue of stranded motorists, accident victims, marathon runners, people made homeless by disaster or the fellow ham that needed help erecting a tower or setting up a station.

He worked with the Salvation Army and was a founder of the SATERN program in Massachusetts. He helped recruit volunteers to make a strong program. Dick also assisted the Red Cross with disaster communications.

Dick was the main force behind the Mystic Valley Radio Group in Medford. They met at Tufts and was originally a packet radio club that developed into a full service club, including repeaters. He loved packet and provided network services all over the area.

We will surely miss his counsel, his humor and his help. Our sincere condolences go to his family and friends.

P25 On the Waltham Repeater

The Waltham 2 meter repeater (146.640 MHz) is now a APCOP25 mixed mode Quantar. It will stay mixed mode only if the analog users don't complain too loudly. If you have VHF P25 radios you are free to use it, but please give right of way to analog users, and keep P25 use out of drive time.

For regular non-digital users a transmit CTCSS of 100.0 Hz has been added so that you don't have to hear P25 digital noise. The input is still carrier squelch so folks without CTCSS (I guess there are still a few) can still use the repeater but CTCSS 100.0 Hz will also work and will keep your radio silent during P25 activity. For digital folks the NAC is 293.

We would also be interested in range reports compared to the GE Master 2 that was removed from service.

Whither the BARC UHF Repeater?

Our 70 cm repeater on 447.175 MHz (-), CTCSS 110.9 Hz, has been reduced in power to accommodate the US Air Force claim of potential interference to the PavePaws radar on Cape Cod. This request, through the FCC and ARRL, applies to all 70 cm repeaters in this area. Since the government has primary use of this band, we must comply.

As expected, the coverage of this repeater has been reduced, and we want to determine the new conditions. If you are able, try to make a contact on this repeater and note your result. Then please send a report to **w1bos@arrl.net** with the following information:

The meeting was called to order at 1930. Attending were:

Bob announced the death of Dick Doherty KA1TUZ. Many remembered Dick with brief anecdotes. A motion was made and seconded to donate \$100 to the American Cancer Society in memory of Dick for all that he has done for the club and its members. The motion passed.

Jim reports the treasury account balance as \$4631.20

Some severe audio problems have been reported on the 2-meter repeater (145.230). Mike says that he now has time to get the new repeater on the air.

Bob reported a successful event for ham radio at the Bikes-Not-Bombs rides on 8 June8. The next event is the BAA Half Marathon on 12 October.

Bob announced that on Saturday, 24 June, the ARRL NE Division Cabinet Meeting would take place in Leominster. He will represent the club.

Jim reported that the Nominating Committee had no candidates for club offices. At that time, Tom, KB1OKP, nominated himself for Vice President; Paul, N1ZKR, nominated himself for another term as Secretary; and Jim, N1ICN, nominated himself for another term as Treasurer. There were no nominations for President. As there were no further nominations, a vote was taken and those nominees were elected to the respective offices.

Bob announced that the club would no longer be able to meet at the Newton Police Community Room starting immediately and a new meeting location would be needed. A lengthy discussion followed with several possible sites being mentioned. It was suggested that a committee should be appointed to investigate some of the possibilities. Frank, N1DHW, said that the new officials at the Salvation Army in Boston had offered us use of their building.

After further discussion, it was agreed that we pursue the use of the Salvation Army building for meetings, beginning with our September 2008 meeting. Frank and Bob will enter a discussion

A motion was made to move the BARC breakfast from the second Sunday to the third Sunday. This would then coincide with the MIT Flea Market and perhaps encourage better attendance. The motion carried. Considering the lead time necessary to notify the members and the remaining MIT Flea Market schedule, a subsequent decision was made to implement this change starting in January 2009.

Jim will check with the bank and get new signature cards for the checking account.

Field Day will be held at Larz Anderson Park in Brookline on Saturday, 28 June only. There will be 2 complete club stations provided. Others are welcome to bring their own stations to set up with us.

The business portion of the meeting adjourned at 2100.

Free Tower

There is a free 35-foot tower available for the taking in Framingham. It must be taken down with a crew of people as it is not disassembled. Here's the description from Sumner, W1VIV:

35-foot tower (approx.) made up of three 10 foot sections and one tapered top section. Manufacturer is unknown. It's about the same size as Rohn 25, with tubular sections like the Rohn, but the horizontal welded cross pieces are flat sections, unlike the Rohn. Tower is clean, heavily galvanized with no surface rust. The tower is located in Framingham.

Lightning Safety Preparedness

Even if it is obvious, you must know this: Lightning is a fast high current discharge. Every current path has inductance. Therefore this fast current induces a high voltage across this inductive path. Your body, your antenna, that tree and your car are all paths.

Think about this – every utility pole has a ground wire running from the top to the earth. You cannot count on it protecting anything because the current (direct or induced on the lines from far away) down the "ground" wire induces enough voltage, top to bottom, to break down everything on the pole.

If you are outdoors in water, even ankle deep, the currents from distant lightning go in every direction in that water. There will be enough current for every pink ankle in that water to be toasted. At that point do not fall down in the water or the rest of you will be toasted, too.

Lightning Safety Outdoors

Each year about 400 children and adults in the United States are struck by lightning. About 80 people are killed and several hundred more are left to cope with permanent disabilities. Many of these tragedies can be avoided.

Lightning often strikes as much as 20 miles away from any rainfall. At least 10% of lightning occurs without any visible clouds in the sky - just blue sky. Many lightning fatalities occur ahead of the storm. You are in danger if you can hear thunder. That means lightning is close enough that it could strike your location at any moment. On average, 20% of lightning strike victims die, 80% survive, but 70% of them suffer serious long-term effects.

Here are some lightning safety rules.

- 1. Postpone activities promptly and do not wait for the rain. Go quickly inside a completely enclosed building not a carport, open garage or covered patio. If no enclosed building is available, get inside a hard-topped metal vehicle. The steel frame of the vehicle provides protection if you are not touching metal.
- 2. Be the lowest point. Lightning likes to strike the tallest objects. In general however, you should avoid trees. If you are in an open field like a farm or on a baseball or soccer field you are the tallest object. If you cannot get to an enclosed building or vehicle, crouch down on the balls of your feet.
- 3. Keep an eye to the sky for darkening clouds and listen for thunder. If you can hear it go to a safe shelter immediately.
- 4. Get off bicycles and motorcycles. Do not lean on vehicles.
- 5. Water is a great conductor of electricity. Get out of the water and off the beach. Do not stand in puddles even if wearing rubber boots.
- 6. Avoid metal. Do not hold golf clubs, fishing rods, or tools. Large metal objects can conduct lightning. Small metal objects such as belt buckles can cause burns.

7. Stay several yards away from other people. Do not share a bleacher or bench or huddle in a group.

8. Listen to NOAA weather radio. First, find out if thunderstorms are in the forecast. Next, listen to short term forecasts about thunderstorm activity, damaging winds and large hail in addition to lightning strikes.

- \$14.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session)

You may be reluctant to jump into unfamiliar territory, but it's not a burdensome job. Pencil, paper and the steps to follow are all you need. The opening and closing statements are below. Beyond that, just keep track of those who check in, review the week ahead as shown in the newsletter. Then go around the group asking for comment or announcements. Remember – they are your friends and they would make the same mistakes you might make. They wouldn't dare criticize your errors.

Joe rarely misses a net, but you can take up the slack and your fellow hams will appreciate it.

Preparation for Net Control Operators for the BARC-Net

Here are some simple supplies to have at hand that make the job of net control operator easier.

- ✓ A copy of the BARC-Net Preamble.
- ✓ Lined paper. Record the hams who check-in on every other line, leave a blank line between consecutive check-ins so that you can easily write any notes regarding a check-in during the net.
- ✓ Have a copy of the most recent *The SPARC*. You can quote from it in response to questions from check-ins; for making announcements, especially those found in the minutes of the previous Business meeting. *The SPARC* has announcements of BARC and ham-related events and activities. It's also a ready source of email addresses of BARC officers and staff.
- ✓ A calendar. This will eliminate discrepancies between the day of the week and date of the month, etc.

Are You Vacationing in the Wilderness this Summer?

The Wilderness protocol (see *QST*, August 1995, page 101) calls for wilderness hams to announce their presence on, and to monitor, the national calling frequencies for five minutes beginning at the top of the hour, every three hours from 0700 to 1900 while in the back country.

A ham in a remote location may be able to relay emergency information through another wilderness ham who has better access to a repeater. The calling frequencies are: 52.525, 146.520, 223.500, 446.000, 1294.500 MHz.


Why do people pay to go to the top of tall buildings and then put money in binoculars to look at things on the ground?
