

W1HFA to Introduce the Film CONTACT

The movie *CONTACT* will be screened at the Coolidge Corner Theater on Monday, 1 December at 7:00 pm. This is an adaptation of the Carl Sagan novel exploring the existence of extraterrestrial life. Before the film, astrophysicist Paul Horowitz W1HFA, will give a talk on the search for extraterrestrial intelligence (SETI). A true pioneer in this field, Horowitz and his work are believed to have been the inspiration for Sagan's novel.

Paul Horowitz is Professor of Physics and of Electrical Engineering at Harvard. At age 8, he achieved distinction as the world's youngest Amateur Radio operator. His research group is focused on several problems in experimental astrophysics, including the search for intentional radio signals or laser flashes from extraterrestrial intelligent civilizations.

The lead character in the film, played by Jodie Foster, uses ham radio to discover an intelligent message from deep space.

Thanksgiving Day – Did You Know?

In the fall of 1621, the religious separatist Pilgrims held a threeday feast to celebrate a bountiful harvest, an event many regard as the nation's first Thanksgiving. It eventually became a national holiday in 1863 when Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday of November as a national day of thanksgiving. Later, Franklin Roosevelt clarified that Thanksgiving should always be celebrated on the fourth Thursday of the month to encourage earlier holiday shopping, never on the occasional fifth Thursday.

A preliminary estimate of 271 million turkeys will be raised in the United States in 2008. Of these, 49 million are expected to be raised in Minnesota. The Gopher State is tops in turkey production. It is followed by North Carolina (39 million). The turkeys produced in 2007 together weighed 7.9 billion pounds and were valued at \$3.7 billion.

The forecast for US cranberry production in 2008 is 689 million pounds, up 5 percent from 2007. Wisconsin is expected to lead all states in the production of cranberries, with 385 million pounds, followed by Massachusetts (190 million).

Hams Can Help Scientists Study Shrikes

-- ARRL Letter, October 17, 2008

For the second year, scientists are asking ham radio operators and VHF monitors to assist in scientific studies of Eastern Loggerhead Shrikes **www.shrike.ca/index.html**. If you live in an eastern state and can tune away from the ham bands for a few minutes a day, you could help scientists study this endangered bird species. Every year, these birds leave their captive breeding program in Ontario, Canada, but fewer and fewer are returning in the spring.

Researchers at the University of Guelph in Ontario have placed radio tags on 20 young shrikes. Although the primary purpose of the tags is to determine dispersal patterns - the movements the birds make immediately after leaving their nests - scientists also hope that more may be learned about the birds' fall migration journey. Scientists think the birds will fly south to Florida, but they might also overwinter in Tennessee, North Carolina and states just south of there. You can help by tuning in regularly to the tag frequencies, which are between 172 and 173 MHz. The complete frequency list is published at **www.homingin.com**/, along with articles to help you distinguish the pulsed tags from other signals you may hear. Please listen now, as migration is under way; the radio tag batteries will only function until the end of November.

FEMA's Independent Study Program offers courses that support the nine mission areas identified by the National Preparedness Goal: Incident Management, Operational Planning, Disaster Logistics, Emergency Communications, Service to Disaster Victims, Continuity Programs, Public Disaster Communications, Integrated Preparedness, and Hazard Mitigation.

Education in all of these should be ARES training goals. Here is what Dennis Dura, K2DCD, ARRL Emergency Preparedness and Response Manager, recently told the nation's Section Managers in reference to the ESF#2 Communications course: "Many of you may already be aware of this course (IS-802), or have taken it. It is a relatively new FEMA on-line independent study course that presents the concepts of Emergency Support Function #2-Communications. For those that have heard my presentations around the country, I strongly encourage integrating ARES in the local, county, regional or state government emergency operations plans, of which ESF #2 is a part. This presents us a variety of mission options, not beholding to any one specific group, and we become more aligned with the emergency management structure. The course will take approximately 30 minutes to complete."



This course is valid for exams given until June 30, 2011.

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
