A National Racing Tradition Begins in Boston – Hams Needed

For many years, on the day before the Boston Marathon, there was an informal run on the streets of Boston. That all changed last year when Boston was awarded the US Olympic Women's Marathon Trials. BARC responded with communication support for the 26.2 mile event run in Boston and Cambridge.

This year, to keep the date and advance the running sport, the Boston Athletic Association (BAA) presents a sanctioned 5K (3.1 miles) race followed by a series of four invitational 1-mile races. This series is intended to become a permanent event on the racing calendar. All races will give the runners the thrill of crossing the Boston Marathon Finish Line.

We have been asked to provide ham communications for these events. The date is **Sunday**, **19 April**, with hams assembling at 0700 near the Boston Public Library (more details later). All events are expected to be over by 1130.

Note that there will be no interference with preparations for the Boston Marathon the next day. If you can assist or have any questions, contact me at **walida@arrl.net** or 508.650.9440.

The BARC April Meeting Program

Around here April brings a flood of ham activity – from the here and now to planning for the immediate future. By the time you read this the Boston area will have had ham support for two public service events and will have three more before the end of the month. And then there is Field Day to be made what the club makes it – with more than twenty years of experience.

This month's General meeting on **Thursday**, **16 April** will explain the fit of 2 Meter and 70 centimeter radios and repeaters into public service – how to help you use them and how the communication supports the event.

This will be followed by review of our general plan for Field Day. You will understand how the set-up and the operations will be of the greatest benefit to you. Any class of license can experience the HF bands. Our main objectives are learning and *fun*.

A significant change from last year will be a set up of a "Get-On – The-Air" (GOTA) station. Under the rules a GOTA station may be operated on any Field Day band by any ham licensed since the previous year's Field Day, as long as a valid licensed operator is present for that band. The rules allow the GOTA station points to count in the Field Day score, but the station count is free. What does all that mean and how does it affect you? Come to the meeting and find out.

Our General meetings start at 7:00 pm on the third Thursday of each month at the Salvation Army third floor auditorium. The address is 147 Berkeley St, but the entrance is on Columbus Ave. The nearest **T** stations are Back Bay on the Orange line or Commuter Rail (exit the rear of the station), and Arlington on the Green line. Free parking is available in the adjacent lot entered from Columbus Ave (across the street from the firehouse). A map appears on page 5 of this newsletter.

Remember – this is *your* club and we are here to help *you* have fun and get the most out of ham radio.

HF Packet Experiment

I am experimenting with a QRP HF packet station on 80 meters and I would like to have as many hams as possible try to connect. I want to see how the station would operate as a backup mailbox in Maine, New England and perhaps farther, under low power operation using an NVIS antenna.

The packet station will remain on 3595.50 kHz until further notice. I am interested in knowing the location from which you are trying to access (town and state and/or grid number), signal report, type of antenna and polarization, and what time of day you tried to access the station.

Try the station at any time since 80 meters varies by time of day. The mailbox is N1URA-1 at 300 baud. Leave a message or email your observations to n1ura@arrl.net. Our duties include reporting from hazardous portages around the many dams on the Charles River from Needham to Brighton. Various assignments start between 0700 and 1200, with assignment completions from 1230 to 1630. This is an excellent way for those new to public service to get your feet wet (figuratively only) and learn how hams can support the safety of the community.

It's an outdoor event, yet safe for hams. Because of the terrain along the river bank, a hand held radio with an antenna better than a "rubber duck" and a full 5 watts is necessary.

They are posted by e-mail to barc-list and on PBBSs regularly. If needed, contact any club member who has access to these.

BARC Volunteer Exam Sessions

The Boston Amateur Radio Club holds monthly VE sessions on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. A map is shown on page 5.

If the Brookline Public Schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be canceled.

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School St from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif: for more info.

For those traveling via the **T**, take the "D" branch of the Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician, General, and Extra). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

Let's Get on the Maker Bandwagon

A short while ago, I got an email from a ham in Texas who had attended the Maker Faire (**makerfaire.com**). "Makers" are people who love to tinker and make things. They even have their own magazine, *Make* (**www.makezine.com**).

He was amazed at the lack of any Amateur Radio content. He wrote, "The Maker Faire was unbelievable. Incredible stuff. Pedal powered carnival rides, robots, computer drive routers, kits... Outside of a table with a Vectronics kit, and a license manual, and a QRP book, the only radio stuff was from a pirate radio group."

I'm kind of amazed at this as well. It just goes to show how disconnected Amateur Radio is getting from the mainstream.

These are exactly the kind of people we want to get interested in Amateur Radio, yet there was no one there representing us.

Ham radio needs to be at these events and get plugged into the "maker community." The Faire has not yet released attendance figures for this particular Faire, but more than 65,000 people attended the Faire held in May 2008. Dayton, with its attendance of about 20,000, looks anemic by comparison.

I blogged about this back in May 2008 (http://kb6nu.com/why-cant-dayton-be-more-like-the-maker-faire/). One of the things I suggested then is moving Dayton to some place like Austin. Seriously, if you were a new ham, where would you rather go, Dayton, OH or Austin, TX? Let's be real here.


And can there be a worse place for an event than Hara Arena? The parking lot, where they hold the flea market looks like a mine field, and it usually rains, making the flea market a wet, unpleasant experience. Is it any wonder that fewer and fewer vendors choose to haul stuff out there? Some of us older hams might fondly reminisce about the bargain we found while traipsing around wearing a trash-bag poncho, but a story like that is not going to resonate with new hams.


Please don't get me wrong. I don't mean to badmouth the Dayton Amateur Radio Association or the Hamvention. I actually think they do a great job, all things considered. I'm just pointing out that if ham radio wants to again be part of the mainstream, we have to get with the program. Unfortunately, that program probably won't be at the Hara Arena.

Ham radio has got to figure out how to latch onto the Maker phenomenon. At the very least, the ARRL should have a booth at the next Maker Faire. In addition to all the books and T-shirts, they need to come up with some kind of demo or display to attract makers into ham radio. I don't know what exactly, but I'm willing to start talking about it.

This phenomenon might also be a boon for clubs who hold hamfests. Just as the computer craze turned ham swaps into ham and computer swaps in the '80s, perhaps ham clubs could turn their hamfests into a combination hamfest and Maker Faire in their communities.

As I said earlier, Makers are exactly the kind of people we want in ham radio. Let's go out and get them.
