# Status of the 70 cm BARC Repeater

The new 70 cm repeater has been having a severe problem with receiving. A likely culprit is a nearby saturating signal which gets through the input filters. Earlier tests at an offsite location indicated excellent performance from the repeater. Our crack team is working on the solution.

# The other side of Public Service -- Jim Bradley, KB1JKJ

We all know that Public Service events give us a chance to enjoy our hobby, play with our radios and get on the air, but there is also a human side to these events and the organizations they represent.

Recently my wife, Donna and I supported the MS Challenge Walk, a three-day, fifty mile walk on Cape Cod. The walk uses the Cape Code Rail Trail, which is for the use of walkers and cyclists. To support the walkers the MS Society recruits cyclist to ride up and down the trail and keep an eye on the safety of the participants.

During this year's event Donna, who is a CNA, and I rode our tandem bike. We carry a medical kit and supplies for the walkers (water and extra food). I use a ham radio to keep in touch with Net Control. This year's walk started out the same as previous years and day one was uneventful. On day two while we were checking in with net control at rest stop two, we were asked to return to the start line to shadow one of the special one-day walkers.

We headed back to the start to begin our new assignment, not knowing exactly what to expect. When we arrived, the bike crew captain said that they had a one-day walker who has MS. They wanted us to follow the walker and Todd, who was with MS to provide communions and medical support.

As we waited at the start line, the first group of walkers came over the hill and headed out for the rail trail. Then over the top of the hill came our walker, Barbara with Todd. She was walking very slowly and using two canes to assist her. As she came down the hill and passed us to head up the road to the rail trail, you could see she was unsteady.

We mounted the tandem and headed up the road. We quickly caught up to them and passed them. The only way we were going to keep up with them was to walk the bike. We got off and walked in front of them to get cars to move over, while passing us.

Once we made it to the rail trail Donna move up to assist Todd in providing soft touch support, to make sure Barbara did not fall. As I followed behind them I thought about the quote "walk a mile in my shoes", I could not imagine the strength and determination required for Barbara to walk. Evan walking behind her in biking shoes and pushing the tandem, I did not even get close to walking in her shoes.

At one point she stumbled and fell slowly to the ground catching all of us of guard. She said it was her legs way of telling her to take a break. She apologized for falling and holding us back from helping others. We assured her that we were here for her; to make sure she was safe and to allow her to walk as far as she wanted.

After resting for a few minutes Barbara was ready to continue so, Donna assisted her as she got back on her feet. Once she was ready we all continued walking to the first rest stop.

Shortly after that Todd dropped back to talk to me. He was observably moved by the motivation and determination of Barbara. He asked me to contact Net Control to make sure there would be a group to cheer for Barbara as we got to the rest stop. I contacted Net Control but had to regain my composure as the emotions of the experience hit me, while trying to express our request for a cheering squad.
