BARC Volunteer Exam Sessions

The Boston Amateur Radio Club holds monthly VE sessions on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are held at 7:00 pm at the Salvation Army Boston HQ building in Boston. This is the same location as our General meetings. The address is 147 Berkeley St, Boston, but the entrance is on Columbus Ave. The nearest T stations are Back Bay on the Orange line or Commuter Rail (exit the rear of the station); and Arlington on the Green line. Free parking is available in the adjacent lot. The entrance to the parking lot is from Columbus Ave. (across the street from the firehouse). A map is shown on page 7.

We give all exams (Technician, General, and Extra). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license and a photocopy for the ARRL, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

Give Your Generator Some Space

The National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST), the same folks that bring you WWV, publish a monthly newsletter called *NIST Tech Beat*. Here's an item from the 10/6/09 issue of *NIST Tech Beat* that will be of interest to radio amateurs:

To subdue the steaming humidity of hurricanes or to thaw out during a blizzard, gasoline-powered, portable generators are a lifeline during weather emergencies when homes are cut off without electricity. But these generators emit poisonous carbon monoxide – a single generator can produce a hundred times more of the colorless, odorless gas than a modern car's exhaust. New research from NIST shows that to prevent potentially dangerous levels of carbon monoxide (CO), users may need to keep generators farther from the house than previously believed – perhaps as much as 25 feet.

Up to half of the incidents of non-fatal CO poisoning reported in the 2004 and 2005 hurricane seasons involved generators run within 7 feet of the home, according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Carbon monoxide can enter a

house through a number of airflow paths, such as a door or window left open to accommodate the extension cord that brings power from the generator into the house. While some guidance recommends 10 feet from open windows as a safe operating distance, NIST researcher Steven Emmerich says the "safe" operating distance depends on the house, the weather conditions and the unit.

A generator's carbon monoxide output is usually higher than an automobile's, Emmerich says, because most generators do not have the sophisticated emission controls that cars do. "People need to be aware that generators are potentially deadly and they need to educate themselves on proper use."

With funding from CDC, NIST researchers are gathering reliable data to support future CDC guidance. NIST building researchers simulated multiple scenarios of a portable generator operating outside of a one-story house, using both a test structure and two different computer models. NIST developed CONTAM, an indoor air quality model and a computational fluid dynamics model. The simulations included factors that could be controlled by humans, such as generator location, exhaust direction and window-opening size, and environmental factors such as wind, temperature and house dimensions. In the simulations the generator was placed at various distances from the house and tested under different weather conditions.

"We found that for the house modeled in this study," researcher Leon Wang says, "a generator position 15 feet away from open windows was not far enough to prevent CO entry into the house." Winds perpendicular to the open window resulted in more carbon monoxide entry than winds at an angle, and lower wind speeds generally allowed more CO into the house. "Slow, stagnant wind seems to be the worst case because it leads to the carbon monoxide lingering by the windows," Wang explains.

Researchers determined that placing the generator outside of the airflow recirculation regions near the open windows reduced CO entry. In the next phase of the study NIST will model a two-story house that researchers believe will interact differently with the wind. NIST researchers also have worked with the Consumer Product Safety Commission on related work.

When Disaster Strikes...

The time you have to prepare may be less than what you need. Your best option is to prepare in advance. Hurricanes, floods, fires, and others may offer sufficient advance warning and provide time for precautionary or preventive action. However, earthquakes or tornadoes usually strike with little or no advance warning.

Individuals who have planned ahead are more prepared and have a lot more options than someone who has not planned and is not ready.

Ask yourself: will you be able to: have enough supplies to last for you and your family? Start collecting items for your "go kit" and make sure everything can be located quickly when needed. Don't wait and try to find everything after disaster hits. You won't remember it all; what you forget is what you will probably need!

Don't forget to change the batteries in your smoke detectors and other battery-operated devices.


A License Plate Collector Needs Help

BARC General Meeting - 19 November The Trophies of Ham Radio

When you contact another ham on the radio you can get a verbal or CW acknowledgement of that contact. But when you can hold that acknowledgement in your hand, especially when that contact was special – DX, long-lost friend, special event, etc. – the tangible acknowledgement is worthy of posting on your wall (or at least put away for safekeeping).

The acknowledgement (QSL) of that contact (QSO) requires careful handling. The BARC General meeting on 19 November will explain the how and why to get the QSL cards. Steve Gilbert, K1SG, will explain why the QSL cards have become such valuable objects for hams around the world.
