### **Message from the President**

BARC has a place to hold its meetings. Thanks to Bob J DiLibero, K1OP, who recommended the Brookline Community Room and gave us a point of contact at the Brookline Police Department. Our new meeting place is the Community Room in Brookline Police Headquarters, 350 Washington Street, Brookline, MA 02445. The next General Meeting is 7:00 pm on Wednesday 17 February. There is a map and an article with meeting dates in this SPARC.

Now that we have a place to meet, it is time to concentrate on the upcoming year. This year's calendar has BARC supporting a number of public service events. We will participate in Field Day, and consider the possibly of operating a Special Event station. We may also set-up a HF station during the New England QSO party.

April is the start of BARC's support of Public Service events and a very busy month. There are three Public Service events for which BARC provides Ham support in April. They are: the MS Boston Walk (Apr 11), the BAA Boston 5K &1 Mile Races (18 Apr) and The Run of the Charles (25 Apr). That's right three events in a row. This will put a strain on the Hams who normally volunteer for these events. That is why BARC needs to recruit more Hams from within the club and around the Boston Area and, why BARC will dedicate a General Meeting open to all Boston Area Hams on the importance of being a Public Service volunteer. The class, scheduled for March, will cover: the significance of Amateur Radio in Public Service events; the equipment a Ham needs to support an event; and radio procedures used during Public Service events. If you are new to Ham Radio or have never volunteered for a Public Service event but always wanted to do so, this is the class to attend. If you are an experienced Public Service volunteer please come. We could use your expertise during the class.

This year's Field Day will again be held at the Bare Cove Fire Museum in Hingham. BARC will operate two days Saturday June 26th and Sunday June 27th. If there is sufficient interest in doing so we may also operate over night on Saturday. We are still in the planning stage. So, if you have any suggestions or concerns about Field Day now is the time let us know?

In an effort to increase interest in HF in our club, BARC is considering sponsoring events that will give our members the opportunity to get on HF in a non-competitive way. During last year's Field Day we offered club members who do not normally operate an HF station, and members with licenses that do not allow HF operation, to get on HF. The GOTA station was a success. However, some Hams seemed intimidated with the competitive nature of the Field Day's HF operation and only wanted to make one contact. The opinion of experienced HF'ers at Field Day was that the first timer HF'er was very interested in HF operations, and maybe we should offer a noncompetitive opportunity to our members to get on HF in the future. So, BARC is looking into two possibilities to encourage members to get on HF in a non-competitive environment. They are: first, a Special Event Station which would be set-up at Blue Hill Observatory, honoring their 125th anniversary; and second, setting-up HF station with the Northeastern University Radio Club during the New England QSO Party (May 1-2). If you are interested in participating in either or both of these events, please let me know. The decision to offer these events will be made at the March Business Meeting.

I hope to see you at the next General Meeting Wednesday 17th of February, 2010. Tom KB1P

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### **Improving Our Communications Efforts**

It happens to us all sooner or later. We listen to the radio for hours on end and slowly but surely, the call signs get more difficult to recognize and the speech becomes harder to understand. Add to this the various kinds of interference and static noise that we all strain to listen through in order to get what we can from that treasured contact and we have a problem that is very difficult to resolve.

The more we strain to hear, it seems hearing becomes more difficult. The truth is that it really does become more difficult to hear. As we age hearing normally deteriorates. Constantly straining to hear through the speaker or headphones accelerates the deterioration. This is a problem that has plagued pilots since soon after radios began being used in aircraft. And hams are not exempt. While we're not likely to crash an airplane because we didn't get the communication right, there are other possible repercussions. Certainly not the least of these are hindrances during emergency procedures and not getting full enjoyment from the radio hobby.

So, what is it that causes these difficulties that we encounter in listening? The answer lies in several places, but most notably in two distinct areas. The first area is that of diction. It seems that the past few decades have seen a serious decline in the use of good diction. The second distinct area is that of operating procedures. All too often call signs are given and other words are spoken that are very very difficult to understand through background noise, static, and other QRM.

But what can we do to eliminate, or at least reduce, some of the problems encountered in making a good QSO? Again, we have two distinct things that can be done, first and foremost, in order to improve our communication efforts. The first one is to make an effort to speak as clearly as we can. This does take practice, but it can be done. The second is to make good use of the phonetic alphabet. The current phonetic alphabet as approved by the International Telecommunications Union (ITU), See Table 1. Reference http://www.arrl.org/FandES/field/forms/fsd220.html.

So, by speaking clearly and using the phonetic alphabet, we can offset some of the ravages of QRM, static, and hearing loss. Our communication efforts will then become more accurate and enjoyable.

**Treasurer's Report:** Jim, N1ICN, Treasurer reported that the club bank balance was \$ 3161.19. Tom also, gave Jim a number of membership renewal forms and checks.

**Repeater Report:** Mike, N1IST, was not in attendance, so Tom KB1P, commented that the 2 meter repeater, 145.230, seems to be working okay. He stated that there have not been any complaints from the Monday Night Net. On the 444.050 side, Tom KB1P reported that the receiver still has significant saturation and is not usable.

**Public Service:** Our first public service event this year is the MS Boston Walk on Sunday April 11. This will be follow by BAA Boston 5K & 1 Mile Race Walk on Sunday April 18 and the Run of the Charles on Sunday April 25. Jim KB1JKJ and Rick KB1LYJ will be the contacts for the MS Walk. Tom KB1P will be the contact for the BAA races and Run of the Charles.

#### **Old Business:**

**BARC's Future Business & General Meetings:** Tom KB1P reported that he had contacted the Brookline Police Department about using their Community Room at Police Headquarters for the BARC meetings and VE exams. The request was approved by the Brookline Police Department on Wednesday January 13. A motion was made and approved to hold future meetings in the Community Room at Brookline Police Headquarters, for the dates shown below. *New England QSO Party 1-2 May 10:* No decision was made about setting up a GOTA station for the New England QSO Party. Discussion was about the timing of the event and the number of Public Service Events in April. Joe will look into the possibility of co-hosting the NE

QSO Party with the North Eastern the club at NU's radio shack. There was talk about of holding a Get on the Air event instead at the Blue Hill Observatory, during their annual open house week-end/ 125 Anniversary Event at the end of May. Mark KB1EKN will follow up on this.

**SPARC:** Mailing vs. e-mail and the number of newsletters mailed to non-members was discussed. The average number of newsletters mailed is 100-125 per month with a postage cost of about \$50.00 per month. A motion was made and passed to send a Business Letter to all non-members describing our interest in "going green" and asking if e-mail delivery would be acceptable. Tom KB1P and Jim KB1JKJ will work on the letter and putting together a list of non-members.



### Winter Projects

#### -- Jim Bradley, KB1JKJ

We still have a few months of cold weather and Old Man Winter. Here is another project to keep you busy.

This project is a To-Go-Box for your mobile radio and power supply, for use at public service events and ARES deployment. This project starts with a Task Force 6" x 13" Classic Tool Case (Item #: 24981), I got mine from Lowe's for about \$25. (18" x 13" x 6")



The picture above shows the finished project. It has a RJ45 connector for the microphone, this way there are no cables coming out of the box that could be damaged if the lid were to be closed during operation.


The SO-239 connector was originally located where the AC Power Socket is located. This was moved to the current location next to the handle to better protect the connector during transportation.

The AC Power Socket was recycled form an old PC this allows using a standard PC power cable to power the unit and keeps the cable from being damaged if the lid is closed during operation.

Inside the Tool Case is an Alinco DM-330MV power supply. An Icom 2720 with remote mounted head and an MFJ-281 speaker are mounted in the top of the case. Also in the lid is a clip board, for holding paperwork, and a pen holder.

To support all this equipment I added  $16-1/2'' \times 11-1/2'' \times 4''$  thick plywood backer boards to the inside of the top and bottom of the case. To allow

for future modifications, I used #8 Tee-Nuts with prongs in the plywood rather than using wood screws to attach the backer boards to the case and mount the equipment.



To mount the power supply I used 2 pieces of extruded aluminum angle  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 5" long. These were attached to the plywood using the Tee-Nuts and #8 screws. I drilled two  $\frac{1}{2}$ " holes in the vertical part of the extruded angle, which I ran tie wrap thorough to secure the power supply in place.

To allow the use of different radios in the To-Go-Box, I mounted the radio to a daughter board. For the daughter board I used a 6" x 8-1/2" x  $\frac{1}{4}$ " thick piece of Lexan plastic. I made extras to mount other radios. I mounted the mobile mounting bracket and ICOM radio to the Lexan daughter boards. On the backer board I installed two 1-1/4" #8 screws from the backside of the plywood, creating a 1" studs.

The daughter board mounts over the studs and is held in place using two wing nuts. This allows the radio to be quickly removed and exchanged for another radio, mounted on one of the extra daughter boards.

To bring in AC power for the Power Supply I used an AC power socket from an old PC. To this I soldered a 1-1/2 foot piece of 3-conductor wire which was from an old PC power cable. To protect the solder joints I used shrink wrap over each of the 3 wires and one larger piece of shrink wrap over the three wires. On the other end of the cable is a female 3 Wire Rubber Plug, which the Power Supply is plugged into.

To power the radio and other accessories, three 2 wire DC power cables with Powerpole connectors are connected to the output terminals on the back of the power supply. One cable is fused with 15 amp fuses on both leads. The other 2 cables are installed in a Powerpole Chassis Mount for powering accessories.

The ICOM 2720 head is installed in the lid of the Tool Case along with an external speaker.

Also in the Lid is the clip from a clipboard for holding papers. Originally I used the clip from clipboard A but found that it did not hold the papers very well. I replace it with the clip from clipboard B, this one works much better. 2 small eye screws were installed about 5" below the clip, space about 12" a part. This allow a rubber band to be stretched across to the two eye bolts and holds papers in place.

That is the basics of my To-Go-Box; let me know if you have any suggestions to improve on this. Do you have a different concept for a To-Go-Box and want to share it with us, e-mail a picture and we will include in a future The SPARC. Send Comments or Pictures to james.bradley4@comcast.net.
