## **Message from the President**

March is here. This is the month where winter ends and spring starts. It means if it snows just wait awhile and nature will take it away. I won't put my snow shovel away though. I learned my lesson one April 1st when we got about 2 feet of snow. March is also the month before BARC's Public Service events start. BARC sponsors three events in April. The first event is The MS Boston Walk (Sunday 11 April). The start and finish lines are in Harvard University Stadium and the walk is around the Charles River. The second event is BAA 5K and 1 Mile Races (Sunday 18 April). The start and finish line is the finish line for the Boston Marathon. The third event is the Run of the Charles (Sunday 25 April). It is New England's largest canoe and kayak race includes 6, 9, and 19 mile races, a 24-mile, five-leg canoe relay race, and a 26-mile professional marathon. The race has a number of starting points along the river, and ends on Soldiers Field Road across from Channel 4.



#### What is the BostonARC Yahoo Group?

There has been some confusion about the difference between the BARC List and the Boston ARC Yahoo Group and some questions why the club needs the Boston ARC? The major difference between the two is The BARC List is open to all Boston area Hams, where the Boston ARC Yahoo Group is restricted to club members. I will explain why the Boston Amateur Radio Club needs the Boston ARC group.

First, the purpose of the Boston ARC is to keep members informed about club actives and provides a vehicle where members can find answers to their Ham related questions. It is not designed to replace the BARC List or for that matter the SPARC.

The Boston ARC is a Yahoo group. Unlike the BARC List, which only offers e-mail, the Boston ARC yahoo group offers other services in addition to e-mail. There is a calendar where the club posts events. A club member can post files and photos, where other members can access them at their convenience. It is also a way for the club to pass information to its members between issues of the SPARC. In addition a club member, who missed a General meeting, can go to the files section and view the slides used during the meeting they missed.

The group was formed a little over a year ago. It currently has around 43 members. The file section has six files mostly slides from past general meeting classes. They also include articles on: How to Build a 20 meter Dipole; Introduction to PSK31; and 2 Meter/70 cm Guide for New Hams. The Photo section has photos of club members at different club events. The message section has over 100 e-mails on various club related subjects.

The Boston ARC is limited to club members and you have to ask to join or are invited to join. If you have not joined the group and want too, please send an email to: bostonARC-subscribe@yahoogroups.com asking to join.

I hope this explanation ends the confusion over the difference between the BARC List and The Boston ARC Yahoo Group. I think the club needs its own forum and the Boston ARC group is the answer.

7:10 PM Meeting was brought to order by Tom, KB1P.

**Treasurer's Report:** Jim N1ICN, Treasurer reported that the club bank balance was \$ 3,456.89.

**Repeater Report:** Mike N1IST, was not in attendance. Tom KB1P reported that 2 meter repeater, 145.230, is working fine and that Monday Night Net has not noticed any problems with the repeater.

On the 444.050 side, Tom KB1P reported that the receiver still has significant saturation and is not usable. Tom is going to check with John to see where we are in trying to find out where the interference is coming from.

**Public Service:** Tom KB1P has sent out an e-mail requesting hams for the following events. The list he used came from Bob, WA1IDA's Public Service List, which is a list of members that have participated in previous BARC supported Public Service Events.

MS Boston Walk on Sunday April 11: so far we have 9 hams.

BAA Boston 5K & 1 Mile Race Walk on Sunday April 18: so far we have 7 hams.

Run of the Charles on Sunday April 25: so far we have 7 hams.

#### **Old Business:**

**SPARC:** A motion was made and passed approving a Business Letter and the list of non-members who will receive the letter describing our interest in "going green" and asking if them if e-mail delivery would be acceptable. The letter will be sent out before the end of the month.

#### **New Business:**

**Membership Services:** Discussions about the functions and responsibilities of Membership Services were followed by a motion to appoint Linda Blair NA1I to that position. The motion passed with a note to thank Charlie KB1RCN and Rosie KB1RCO for their service in this position.

Field Day 26-27 June 10: This year's Field Day will be held at the Bare Cove Fire Museum. We will operate on both Saturday and Sunday with the possibility of operating overnight on Saturday. There was a discussion about finding a Field Day Coordinator and committee to oversee the event. Additional discussions were about feeding the masses, scout tours, and other family activities such as a tour of the Train Museum or a Ranger Walk. No decisions were made and discussion was tabled until we can find a coordinator and committee.

Increasing HF Use: Discussion was around holding an event designed to get more members on HF. Three events were discussed; the New England QSO Party (1-2 May 10), Special Event Station at the Blue Hill Observatory in September to celebrate their 125th anniversary, and the Jamboree on the Air (JOTA) in October. Tom KB1P will check with Joe N1QD about joining the Northeastern Club for the New England QSO Party. Tom KB1P will also check with the Blue Hill Observatory about an event in September.

**BARC Breakfast:** The BARC Breakfast poll was reviewed. At this point 9 people, which is less than 10% of the members polled, have responded. The poll showed that currently there is not much interest in the BARC Breakfast. A motion was made and passed to suspend the BARC Breakfast and to remove mention of it from The SPARC and the BARC Website. We will revisit this at some future date.

## **Winter Projects**

With the winter almost over and our public service events starting next month, I decided to use the time to check out my equipments and put together a go bag for supporting public service events.

My kit starts with a Yeasu VX-7R, with the following accessories: an extra battery, mini speaker/microphone, earpiece/microphone, microphone adapter, DC cable charger and antenna. I keep all these items in a canvas bag that I bought at a local hardware store; there were three bags in the set.



In one of the other canvas bags I keep a pad of paper, some post-it-notes flashlight, a whistle, index cards, pens and pencils.



I carry these bags in a fanny pack, which I purchased from Campmor.com. The bag has two water bottle pockets on either side of the main compartment.

Also, in this pack I carry a personal first aid kit with sunscreen, a multi-purpose tool, and a copy of the radio manual in a plastic bag, my BARC badge and some snacks for long days.

Just before the event I recharge the batteries, add two water bottles, route maps and event specific details which I keep in plastic document protector sheets.

## NHC to Provide Greater Lead Time for Watches, Warnings-- ARRL Letter, 14 January 14, 2010

Beginning with the 2010 hurricane season, NOAA's National Hurricane Center in Miami will issue watches and warnings for tropical storms and hurricanes along threatened coastal areas 12 hours earlier than in previous years. According to NHC experts, advancements in track forecasts are making it possible for forecasters to provide greater lead time. Tropical storm watches will be issued when tropical storm conditions are possible along the coast within 48 hours. Tropical storm warnings will be issued when those conditions are expected within 36 hours. This is an increase of 12 hours from those issued in previous years. Hurricane season runs from June 1 to November 30 for the Atlantic Basin.

Hurricane names for 2010 are Alex, Bonnie, Colin, Danielle, Earl, Fiona, Gaston, Hermine, Igor, Julia, Karl, Lisa, Matthew, Nicole, Otto, Paula, Richard, Shary, Thomas, Virginie and Walter.

#### What is Multiple Sclerosis?

or loss of vision. The progress, severity, and specific symptoms of MS are unpredictable and vary from one person to another. Today, new treatments and advances in research are giving new hope to people affected by the disease.

#### The Run of the Charles Canoe and Kayak Race

Charles River Watershed Association (CRWA) mission is to use science, advocacy and the law to protect, preserve and enhance

the Charles River and its watershed.

One of the country's oldest watershed organizations, CRWA was formed in 1965 in response to public concern about the declining condition of the Charles. Initiatives over the last four decades have dramatically improved the quality of water in the watershed and fundamentally changed approaches to water resource management.


