Message from the President

Field Day has come and gone. For those who could not make it to the Bare Cove Fire Museum, you missed out on a great time. Thanks to the expert planning of Mark, KB1EKN, Field Day Coordinator and Geri, KB1ISG, Food Director for Field Day and The Bare Cove Fire Museum representative the event went on without a hitch. This Field Day we met our object of having fun and made 635 contacts.

Thanks to the efforts of Dan, KA1RDZ; Eric, K1NUN; Geri, KB1ISG; Hank, K1QK; Jean, KB1QVV; Jim, N1ICN; Joe, N1QD; John, K1BBN; Bob, WA1IDA; Elaine, N1GTB; and Mark, KB1EKN; we were set up and ready to go at 1200 hrs. This gave us time to check each station's set up and allowed us to give a short class on how to use the logging soft ware. After some practice we were ready to go at 1400 hrs.

This year we set up four stations that operated for 24 hours. Each station was manned by an operator and logger. The stations were connected with a router and logging software (provided by Joe, N1QD). The logging software not only kept track of contacts and checked for dupes, but it allowed each station to see the total log and warned when another station was on the same band and mode. So at any time a person could look at any of the computer screens and see; total number of contacts, the bands on which the contacts were made, who made the contacts, and the rate of contacts made in the past 20 minutes and one hour. Using this information we could make decisions on which bands were active and which bands were not active, allowing us maximize the number of contacts.

Although our objective was to have fun, which we had, Sunday morning we realized that we could make 700 contacts. Every effort was made to reach the goal, but the bands would not cooperate. We started to tear down at 1330 hrs but we left one radio operational until 1400 hrs hoping we could still make 700 contacts.

One of the great things our logging software enabled us to do was to analyze our results. Here is the data Joe, N1QD provided. Total contacts 635, [120 by CW, 513 by Phone, 2 by Digital]; Results by band: 80m 115, 40m 203, 20m 109, 15m 97, 10m 111; Contacts by operator; N1QD 242, W10HM 186, KB1EKN 75, K1NUN 44, K1QK 24, K1BBM, 22,KB1QHX 21, KB1P 19, and N1ICN 2. A great time was had by all.

Meeting was called to order by Tom, KB1P at 1915.

Treasurer's Report: Jim N1ICN, Treasurer reported that the club bank balance was \$4124.48.

Tom opened the meeting by reviewing recent public service activities and coming events.

The BARC election was held and the nominees were unanimously elected. They are:

Mark outlined the Field Day plans. There was discussion about how many antennas to erect and how many station we will operate. For HF we will erect 2 B&W wire antennas one or more verticals (R8 and maybe R7) and a beam. We'll also erect a VHF antenna.

We will run overnight on Saturday and likely operate 4 HF and 1 VHF stations. A few folks will go to the Bare Cove Fire Museum on Thursday to check the coax and to be certain everything is in order for set up on Saturday AM.

There will be a Saturday night "cook out" and a Sunday breakfast for those hams staying overnight.

Joe will set up a new logging system. It will be a marked improvement on our past system.

Linda and Bob will look into purchasing one or more new storage batteries for the club radios.

Bob reported that TSA employees have been asked to become Hams. No details are available.

Bob also reported that we should consider whether we know of anyone who should be recommended for ARRL Foundation money for e.g. a scholarship.

Emails Asking for Personal Information Are *Not* from ARRL -- ARRL Letter, 24 June 2010

ARRL has received reports from members with <arrl.net> email accounts who have recently been contacted via email asking for personal information, such as user names and passwords. Be assured that these emails are fraudulent attempts at phishing and did not originate from ARRL. "This is a very crude attempt at phishing, using an easily determined spoof of the originating/return address," said ARRL Chief Financial Officer Barry Shelley, N1VXY. "There is never a time when we would ask via mass email for user names and passwords of <arrl.net> users. There is simply no need to ever do so." If you receive an email asking for personal information and it looks like it originated from ARRL, **do not respond – just delete it.**
