Beginning in January 2011, BARC will change the publication of this newsletter by maximizing the use electronic delivery. This will reduce the cost of paper publication and postage.

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KY1N List Goes QRT

The KY1N Memorial List, a popular New England resource documenting Volunteer Examinations is no more.

According to Jim Heedles, WW1Y, "with the increased effort and decreased usefulness, I've come to the conclusion that it's time for the KY1N List to go QRT." WW1Y explains further, "For the past couple of years the KY1N list has largely duplicated the data located at the ARRL web site. The effort to reconcile the different data sources used to build the list has become less beneficial to the amateur community as the differences between the KY1N list and the ARRL/VEC list grew less and less." The list was named in honor of Raymond R. Lussier, KY1N (SK), an active volunteer examiner and team liaison for the Mt. Moriah (Salem NH) VE team.

Are the 15, 30 & 45 Amp PowerPoles interchangeable?

Yes. The 15, 30 & 45 Amp contacts all use the same housing. Therefore, they all plug into each other. The only difference between the 15, 30 & 45 amp contacts is the size of the receiving barrel that holds the wire.

Crimping vs. Soldering

One of the many questions we receive is it best to solder or crimp the connectors? Either is OK, but each method should be done properly. If you are going to crimp use a crimper that will not destroy the round shape of the contact. Some brands of crimpers deform the barrel of the contact into an oval. The oval will not allow easy insertion into the housing and therefore requires re-crimping to make sure the contact is still a rounded shape.

Soldering is also acceptable, but you have to make sure that not too much solder is applied and that it does not run down onto the tongue (tip of the contact). Solder flux and solder on the contact add to the resistance of the connection.

In either case if you are using a wire size that may be too small for the contact you may have to fold the wire over (doubling) and then insert it into the contact to properly fill the hole to be able to make a proper crimp/solder connection.

- Your current license and a photocopy for the ARRL, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.


BAA Half Marathon Needs Hams

With nine years of successful events, the Boston Athletic Association Half Marathon continues as a "Boston Tradition." Ham radio has established its community value at times like these. We have been asked again to support safety and administrative communications. With a little fine-tuning, including many ideas from hams, the event is expected to be even better than last year.

The park where the start and finish had been located is undergoing a major renovation, so the 2010 race starts and finishes in beautiful Franklin Park. Obviously the course must be adjusted. It is for this reason that hams can respond with our personal and communications flexibility. For those who have done this event before, you know the road conditions still call for our best support for the athletes. We need you again, and the Race Director has asked for even more ham help (that's what happens when we are appreciated).

The new course has been laid out and qualified to international standards. Much of the original route on the "Emerald Necklace" is used.



If you are new to ham public service (or don't have much familiarity with it), this is an easy introduction to getting in on the action and fun of community service without much pressure.

Date: Sunday, 10 October 2010

Ham start: 0600

Ham finish: 0930 to 1130 (depending on location)

Yes, I know it is the day before the Columbus Day holiday. The upside is it starts early and ends early, leaving plenty of time to enjoy the long weekend. Your help is greatly needed to continue this as a superb event and to uphold our reputation for dependable support. Our assignments consist of monitoring hazardous and critical locations along the course, and the medical/support stations. As we did in the past, we plan to use a 2-meter repeater and possibly a 70-cm repeater. A hand-held with a good battery and an antenna better than a "rubber duck" is the way to go.

If you can help, please contact the BARC Public Service Office as soon as possible. The assignments and more detail will be sent as soon as

they are available. For many of the assignments, you can go directly to your station. Please send your best email address and a phone number (cell, also). Be Careful of the "Anti-Texting" Law -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA

The recently enforced Massachusetts law banning "texting" while driving appears to exempt Amateur Radio operators (see Section 3 in the bill). This is an area where zealous law enforcement may question a ham's similar activity and force the ham to defend the position. This defense could be costly in time and money, so it is best to avoid forcing a test of the principle.

Hams under 18 should be particularly aware since all cell phone use while driving (or in a travel lane) is prohibited. Ham radio activities are permitted but be prepared to make extensive explanations.

The suggestion here is for hams to carry a copy of your FCC license *and* a copy of the pertinent law with you at all times while driving. The law may be found at:


