ARRL Warns Members to be Aware of Email Scams -- ARRL Letter, December 15, 2011

Many ARRL members with arrl.net email accounts have recently received bogus emails in a "phishing" attack. These are scams designed to scare people into emailing back personal information - such as user names and passwords - to the scammer at an unknown address. This particular attack was more sophisticated than usual, but far from unique.

"There is never a time when we would ask via email for user names and passwords of arrl.net users," explained ARRL IT Manager Michael Keane, K1MK. "There is simply no need to ever do so. If you receive an email asking for personal information and it looks like it originated from ARRL, please do not respond. The best thing you can do when receiving bogus emails is to simply add it to the spam list in your computer's email program and delete it. Please don't forward it to ARRL HQ - we will have already seen it and are already responding to it."

ARRL members - and anyone who uses email services - should be constantly aware that email is far from secure. If anyone ever asks you for personal information via email, it probably is a scam, no matter how pretty or professional their logo or graphics may appear.

Tower Safety Rules To LIVE By

W1GFF wrote:

Boston news outlets reported that a tower worker fell 1,000 feet to his death from the American Radio Systems tower next to Route 128 in Newton. The tower was formerly known as the WHDH-TV Channel 5 tower, but after Ch 5 lost their license in the 70s it became known as FM-128 and was the home to a number of FM radio stations and two-way customers. The tower is now owned by American Tower Systems.

John Beanland, G3BVU, wrote:

W1GFF has drawn our attention to the fatal accident on October 12, 2011 on the WHDH tower in Newton. Fatal accidents on a tower should **NEVER** happen provided a simple set of safety rules are followed 100%.

- 1. Use a "climbing belt" and two straps. If you have only one strap, **DON'T CLIMB**.
- 2. Carefully examine the belt and both straps before putting them on, *REJECT IF DAMAGED*.
- 3. When only a few feet off of the ground, place one strap around the tower and throw your weight on it. **DO NOT HOLD THE TOWER**. If something breaks you will suffer only a bruise or two as you hit the ground.
- 4. Repeat the test with the second strap alone.
- 5. With two straps there are four ends.
- 6. ALWAYS HAVE AT LEAST ONE STRAP AROUND THE TOWER AND THREE ENDS CONNECTED TO YOUR BELT.
- 7. When you come to a set of guys that prevent you from climbing farther, pass one strap around the tower on the other side of the guys and secure to your belt before releasing one end of the strap that is preventing further progress on the tower. This method applies when going up **OR** down the tower.
- 8. YOU MUST ALWAYS BE SECURED TO THE TOWER BY YOUR BELT AND AT LEAST ONE STRAP.

The tagline for the site is "capturing the human spirit of Amateur Radio," and my motivation for setting up the site is to capture personal stories of how Amateur Radio has touched lives - either the lives of Amateur Radio operators themselves, or of the people that we serve.

The site has only been online a month, and I already have several good stories. I reposted my story about checking the QSLs of a county hunter, and there are also stories about an international friendship that survived WW II and a story about how an Elmer touched the life of his student. These are exactly the type of stories I want to collect.

If you have a great story about ham radio, I want to hear about it and to publish it on <www.hamradiostoryproject.com>. If you want to tell the story yourself, let me know, and I'll set up an account for you on the site. If you would like some help, let me know, and I'll contact you and either write the story myself, or find someone else to help you.

I don't want to lose another great story because there isn't a place to tell it. HamRadioStoryProject is the place to tell it.


In Space: FASTRAC-1 Satellite Digipeater Active -- ARRL Letter, December 8, 2011

As of 1600 UTC December 2, the FASTRAC-1 satellite (FO-69) is open for use as a packet radio digipeater. Anyone with a 1200 baud packet TNC and a VHF/UHF FM transceiver can try it. If you own <u>satellite tracking software</u>, you'll find the latest orbital elements on the <u>FASTRAC Web site</u>. FASTRAC-1 receives at 145.825 MHz and transmits at 437.345 MHz. The digipeater alias is FAST1. To connect to ARRL Headquarters station W1AW through FASTRAC-1, for example, you would send the following packet: **C W1AW VIA FAST1**

Amateur Radio in Space: ARISSat-1 Re-enters Earth's Atmosphere, Falls Silent -- ARRL Letter, January 5, 2012

According to <u>AMSAT</u>, <u>ARISSat-1 stopped transmitting</u> on the morning of January 4. It is believed that the satellite reentered the Earth's atmosphere around 0700 UTC (+/- three hours) and was destroyed soon after. Telemetry reports showed that the temperature aboard ARISSat-1 had been rising as the atmospheric drag began to affect the satellite The predicted decay location is an open part of the South Atlantic, well west of Angola.

The last telemetry reports indicated that the internal temperature had topped 167 degrees Fahrenheit and was rising rapidly. Konstantin Vladimirovich, RN3ZF, sent a reception report of a pass at 0842 UTC and stated, "The telemetry was absent, voice messages were not legible, very silent and interrupted. Most likely, I saw the last minutes in the life of the satellite." The last full telemetry captured was received from ground stations as the satellite passed over Japan at 0602 UTC on January 4.

ARISSat-1 was <u>deployed</u> from the International Space Station on August 3, 2011 during EVA-29 on by Cosmonaut/Flight Engineers Sergei Volkov, RU3DIS, and Alexander Samokutyaev. The satellite carried a student experiment from Kursk State University in Russia that measured atmospheric density. Students from around the world provided the voices for the FM voice announcements.

AMSAT President Barry Baines, WD4ASW, said that ARISSat-1 marked a new type of satellite that captured the attention of the national space agencies

around the world. "With ARISSat-1, we have been able to design, launch, and operate a unique educational opportunity," he explained. "By designing an educational mission aligned with NASA's Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics goals, radio amateurs around the world have been able enjoy a new satellite in orbit."

ARISSat-1 achieved several "firsts" for Amateur Radio in space, including the first flight test of the AMSAT Software Defined Transponder, which included an FM voice downlink cycling between student messages, spoken telemetry and SSTV; a 16 kHz bandwidth linear transponder; a CW beacon carrying telemetry and call signs of radio amateurs (noting their significant contributions to Amateur Radio in space) and a robust, forward-error-corrected 1kbps BPSK digital downlink carrying satellite telemetry and Kursk experiment telemetry.

Up Your Operating Skills -- ARRL Contest Update, December 7, 2011

Listen - Listen to the call sign the CQing station responds to and don't be a lid - stand by if it's not very close to your call. Too many stations just keep calling and calling, regardless of who the CQer comes back to. If you're transmitting, you are not listening and can't tell what the CQing station is doing. Give a couple of calls, then listen – it's a lot easier to get through that way.

Answer - If you answer a CQing station and they respond with an error in your call, the most reliable way to be sure they have your call correctly is to send *only* your call sign again and not the exchange. Don't send the exchange until the CQer responds with your correct call - then send your exchange.

Save – Don't toss those PL-259 backshells left over from removing a connector - put them to work! Cover and wrap the back end with tape or a plastic cap and you will have a nice screw-on water-resistant cover for an SO-239. It may not be perfectly waterproof, but it sure helps!

Amateur Radio Balloon Flight Crosses Atlantic, Sets Records -- ARRL Letter, December 15, 2011

Ron Meadows, K6RPT, and his son Lee -- leaders of the California Near Space Project -- successfully launched an Amateur Radio high altitude balloon from San Jose, California on Sunday, December 11 at 4:43 PM PST. The balloon reached a cruise altitude between 105,000 and 115,000 feet, where it continued its travel across the United States, the Atlantic Ocean and Spain and into the Mediterranean Sea. For most of its trip, the balloon traveled at about 150 miles per hour and eventually covered 6236 great circle miles in just 57 hours 2 minutes. According to the CNSP, this is a new Amateur Radio balloon flight record for both distance and duration. Read more here.


Quarterly Business Meetings -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA
