Start Up a Massachusetts - Rhode Island CW Net - Marcia Forde, KW1U, EMA STM

It is great to see more interest in CW these days. It really is a fun mode, especially when you aren't required to learn it for a license.

We had a Section CW net (EMRI) for many years, which met every evening at 7:00 PM. Unfortunately, several years ago we disbanded due to lack of participation. Now however, with the increased interest in CW, I would like to see this net operational again. Since there is no West Mass CW net, I would like this net to represent all of Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

Because some hams are working on building their CW skills, or may be a bit rusty, I would like to see the net run at a "relaxed" pace. You can find opportunities to increase your code speed as you pass traffic, liaise to the region net (1RN), etc. I will be asking the Net Control stations to keep the speed down, and any participants can always ask to please QRS (slow down). It is helpful when checking in to send at a speed you are comfortable copying and the NCS can return at your speed. Don't know how a CW net is run? Listen, read the MPG on the ARRL website, or ask questions of me, or any NCS.

I don't have a frequency at this time. I will have more information later so please monitor this website, <www.ema.arrl.org>. Let me know if you have any questions at: <kw1u@arrl.net>. I have heard from some of you already. The plan is for the net to meet at 7PM. I also suggest beginning with five evenings a week. If enough activity and net control stations are available, we can add weekends. Of course we will need traffic, so please plan on bringing some with you - greetings to family, friends, fellow hams you meet on the bands, thanks for contact, let's make a sked, etc. Be creative.

A Voice from the Past – Tom Bertolino, KB1P

Hi everyone! It has been a little over a year since I pulled up my antenna stakes and moved south with my wife and snow shovel. I thought I owed you an explanation why the impulsive move south.

I made the decision to move south in February 2012 after the forth Nor'easter in less than a month. I was standing knee deep in snow on top of a seven foot high snow bank which lined my driveway. I was trying to flatten the peaks on this white mountain range so I could make room to shovel the foot and half of snow off my driveway that fell the night before. Old man winter was not making it easy. The cold wind was blowing the drifting snow in my face. My cheeks were red and my nose was running. On 12 December 1912, licensing of Amateur Radio operators began. In the four months following the passage of the legislation on 13 August 1912, only 1,185 amateur stations were licensed – just a small fraction of the number believed to be active at that time.


Quarterly Business Meetings -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA

- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
