## Message from the President - Joe Chapman, NV1W

I want to devote this month's ruminations to advice for our newly licensed members on the terrifying syndrome known as Microphone Anxiety. All of us have been there: you've just gotten your first license and your first rig, and now you're facing the psychological bomb trigger that is a PTT switch that's never been pressed.

My first transmission was on the MIT UHF repeater, so I had the benefit of encouragement from friends and the terror of realizing that the people listening on the repeater included one of my professors.

I'm assuming you have a Technician ticket and your new rig operates on the 2 meter band. A reasonable place to start is on a repeater like the 145.230 Boston machine. The first bit of good news is modern radios are set up to handle repeater offsets automatically, so you can just tune to 145.230 and rest assured you'll be transmitting on the right frequency. The other bit of good news is if you mess up the one thing you do have to configure--the 88 Hz CTCSS tone (also called the "PL tone")--nobody will hear you, so you can't make a fool of yourself.

You can, of course, just key up the repeater and say, "KB1XYZ monitoring". After you release the PTT switch you'll hear the repeater's squelch tail (a second or so of hiss) if you made it.

A more structured alternative is to check in to a net. Before doing so it's useful to have a copy of the ITU phonetic alphabet around ("Alpha, Bravo, Charlie", etc.) or at least know the phonetics for your own call sign. If your call sign includes the letter Z, note that most hams use the British pronunciation "zed" to avoid confusion with letters like P. I myself think it's best to stick to the standard phonetics rather than cute ones you make up yourself, but we German-Americans love doing things by the book.

The BARC club net happens every Monday night at 9:00 pm under the able and friendly leadership of Joe, W1JJF. When you check in for the first time he'll ask for your first name and location for the logs, and at some point you'll be asked whether you have any comments for the net. You don't have to make a speech; "Hello everyone, I just got my license and am learning how to use this radio" is plenty. Finish up by giving your call sign and saying "back to net"--this satisfies the FCC requirement that you identify yourself at the end of a conversation.

Another net that welcomes newcomers is the Eastern Mass. 2 Meter Traffic Net; it happens daily at 8:00 pm. This is a traffic (message handling) net, though nobody's going to force you to bring or take traffic if you check in. In addition to knowing the phonetic alphabet, you should know that your "QTH" is your location (a bit of very common ham jargon that some net control stations use), and that when you're invited to "secure" it means that the net control station is giving you permission to leave the net.

So, be bold! And don't worry about the PTT switch triggering a nuclear explosion--on most rigs that's handled by a menu item.

# Microcontrollers!

The next BARC General Meeting will be on **Wednesday, March 20**, at 7:00 pm in the Community Room of Brookline Police Headquarters in Brookline Village. ## **Bylaw Amendment Approved**

The following BARC Bylaw amendment has been approved by the Club after being voted on at the January General Meeting:

#### Section 2: Conditions Of Membership

Such membership term shall complete the current fiscal year and extend to the end of the next fiscal year. If this person is already a member, dues shall be forgiven for the next fiscal year.

## Ferreting Out Noise Sources - Dan Romanchik, KB6NU

About three months ago, I put up a 20 meter antenna - an end-fed, half-wave antenna <**www.kb6nu.com/kb6nu-finally-builds-an-end-fed-half-wave-antenna**>. Right off the bat, I was flummoxed by the high noise level. It was nearly S9, obliterating all but the strongest signals.

The strange thing about this noise was that I was experiencing it only on 20m, and using only this antenna. If I switched to my 40 meter dipole, the noise dropped back to the S1 - S2 level that I usually experience here. (Yes, I know. I'm really lucky to have such a low noise level here.)

It didn't really make any sense to me that this antenna would be so susceptible to noise while my other antennas weren't, but I just couldn't come up with any other explanation. I was not experiencing any noise on any of the other bands, after all. Sometimes 40 meters is so quiet here that I check to make sure that the antenna is connected to the radio.

As luck would have it, I stumbled upon the noise source a couple of days ago. I had taken the laptop I normally use in the shack somewhere one day last week, and when I returned it to the shack that evening, I switched the rig over to 20 meters before connecting the power supply back to the laptop. No noise! When I plugged the power supply into the laptop, the noise jumped up to S9 again. The problem noise source was found!

Т posted about my experience to my blog and to the HamRadioHelpGroup, <groups.yahoo.com/group/hamradiohelpgroup>. Mark, K5LXP, one of the gurus on HRHG, advised me to throw the main circuit breaker in order to determine if it was something inside the house generating the noise. Bob, KONR, commented on my blog post, "I have found that flipping off circuit breakers in my house is a good first step to try and find a noise source. Usually ticks off the family, but what the heck." Either of these methods will help you determine if a noise source is inside or outside of your house.

I'm still thinking that the way my antenna is positioned may have something to do with its picking up the noise generated by the power supply. I plan to play around with the positioning of the antenna once the snow melts and see if that makes any difference. Until then, I can work 20 meters with the power supply disconnected and run the laptop off the battery.

So, the next question you might ask is how does the antenna work otherwise? It seems to be putting out a very good signal. One evening last week, I worked several DX stations, including 6W/HAONAR in Senegal. It's not a beam, but I'm pretty happy with it.

## Looking Ahead At Public Service -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA

### **ARRL, Microsoft Resolve Email Blockage**

After more than 20,000 ARRL members had their **arrl.net** and **arrl.org** emails blocked by Microsoft, the issue has been resolved. According to ARRL Information Technology Manager Michael Keane, K1MK, Microsoft told the ARRL that the mail blockage from ARRL servers to Microsoft domains (including **msn.com**, **hotmail.com**, **live.com** and **outlook.com**) was mitigated as of Sunday, March 10.

### **US Postal Service Introduces Global Forever Stamp**

In addition to an increase in postal rates in January 2013, the US Postal Service introduced a new *Global Forever First-Class Mail International* stamp. Priced at \$1.10 each and offered in a pane of 20, the new global stamp offers a single price for any international First-Class Mail 1-ounce letter to any country in the world, as well as 2-ounce letters to Canada. 
## Quarterly Business Meetings -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA
