### Message from the President - Joe Chapman, NV1W

The closest thing to a coffee-table book that our hobby has is probably <u>Hello World: A life in ham radio</u> by Danny Gregory, KC2KGT, and Paul Sahre, KC2KHN, (New York: Princeton Architectural Press, 2003; ISBN 1-56898-281-X). I ran across my copy during a week of feverish spring cleaning last month, with its bold title "UFROG OFFEH" in Morse on the front cover (the book was upside down).

The main character is Jerry Powell, W2OJW, a Kansan who was first licensed in 1928. Jerry settled in New Jersey after the war, and was an active DXer until his key went silent at the age of 92 in 2001. The authors point out that he wasn't a super ham, but just "a typical radio amateur who got enormous satisfaction from his pastime." On the other hand, he did look like a ham straight out of central casting.

The main part of the book is devoted to Jerry's QSL collection, and what a collection it was! The first is from 5GF of Shawnee, Oklahoma, dated June 27, 1928; the last one is from the year 1995. There are some treats: cards from DXpeditions to Conway Reef, Clipperton and Howland islands, another from the first amateur licensee in Albania back in the old days. The graphics range from an ordinary picture postcard or simple presentations of call signs, through an odd dopeaddled hippie-looking design from a businessman in Cuba in 1948, to photographs of the more exotic locales.

About a third of the cards are annotated, and Gregory and Sahre did a fabulous research job. They found the daughter of Art Bard, CEIAR, the power superintendent of an isolated mining camp in northern Chile, and recount the obscure history of Clipperton island. The cards are also presented in chronological order, with a timeline running along the bottom of the page reminding you of what the rest of the world was doing at the time.

Here and there you find short essays for the general reader on various aspects of ham radio: DXpeditions, contesting, public service, and Morse code.

Gregory reports that he was inspired to write the book after finding the QSL collection at a flea market. He bought it, took it home and puzzled over it. In the course of time both he and his coauthor got their licenses, and although they never met him, consider Jerry their Elmer.

I felt a lot of nostalgia looking at the cards, thinking back to my own beginnings in radio and QSL collection from shortwave radio stations in the early 70's. As fine a thing as LoTW and eQSL are, one can hardly imagine a bunch of bits inspiring a book.

I recommend the book to you, and as we say in the land of upside-down Morse, 37!

At 7:15 PM Joe Chapman announced that Brett Smith would be speaking at the April General Meeting and Bob Salow at the May Meeting.

Jim Clogher reported \$3,589.27 in the checkbook and that several people from the last VE session are applying to the BARC membership.

Brett Smith, AB1RL, reported that he has 11 people for the MS Walk and 14 for the BAA's 5K. He had some difficulty with emails but has it under control.

Joe Chapman, NV1W reported that he has spoken With Blake regarding a possible meeting site that might be adapted to setting up an antenna in the Western Ave section of Brighton. More info will be coming.

Mark Duff, KB1EKN brought up the matter of dues, suggesting if they are dropped by \$5 there may be an increase in membership. The dues were raised in the past to cover the cost of mailing a paper newsletter which is now emailed. Doc Kinne, KE1ML suggested that that \$5 could be put towards acquiring additional antennas. Robert Freed, W1RJF, suggested that a repeater fund might be set up instead to encourage others to make a tax deductible donation. Mark Duff, KB1EKN suggested that all think on the dues issue and return to it at a fall meeting.

Hank Buccigross, K1QK started discussion regarding Saturday General Meetings in hopes of getting more people to attend. Traffic getting in and out of the city is a concern, some members do not go out at night, some are not available on weekends and it may impact available speakers or public service events. It was suggested to put it before the membership for discussion.

Joe Chapman, NV1W led a discussion concerning the repeater on the Federal building. After the January storm direction was lost to the north and west. It appears the antenna may have been wind damaged. Mark Duff, KB1EKN is ready to schedule time to go up and look it over and perhaps repair it. This would entail one or two weekday trips, one to test and one to repair.

Voted: to authorize the Repeater committee to spend up to \$1,000.00 if necessary to repair the antenna.

Voted: to spend \$400.00 to cover the costs of Field Day 2013.

It is useful for determining locations for propagation prediction and other programs based on FCC database address records or for your own location.

Go to <http://stevemorse.org/jcal/lation.php> and fill out the boxes. Beware: the conversion data utilizes several sources which will be displayed with minor differences among them. Hey, it's good enough for government work or radio waves.


### Quarterly Business Meetings -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA

- Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
