Radiosport: New ARRL Single-Operator Unlimited Contest Category Now in Effect -- The ARRL Letter, January 9, 2014

Responding to many requests, the ARRL Programs and Services Committee in 2013 accepted the Contest Advisory Committee (CAC) recommendation to add the Single-Operator Unlimited category to the ARRL 10 Meter Contest, ARRL 160 Meter Contest, RTTY Roundup, and the IARU HF Championship. "This particular issue has been a long time coming," said CAC Chairman Al Dewey, KOAD.

The new category permits the use of spotting information within the Single-Operator class. In the past, using spotting information placed a station in the Multioperator category. Per the revised rules, "Single-Operator Unlimited: The use of spotting assistance or automated, multi-channel decoders is permitted."



Contest Announcement

The Wireless Society of Southern Maine would like to invite radio amateurs from Maine and New England to participate in the 4th annual Maine 2 Meter FM Simplex Challenge contest.

The contest takes place Sunday, February 16th, 2014, and runs for 4 hours, beginning at 12:00 PM local time (1700 UTC). Contacts are limited to FM Simplex on the 2 meter band. Participants may be entered as either fixed or mobile.

This contest is designed so anyone with a 2 meter HT, mobile, or base station can participate. There are several entry categories based on power level, and whether you are fixed or mobile. It can be a lot of fun, and also serves as a good exercise for emergency preparedness.


Quarterly Business Meetings -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA

We give all exams (Technician, General, and Extra). Testing is by reservation only. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license and a photocopy for the ARRL, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
