BARC's public service season is in full swing - Come join us! -- Brett Smith, AB1RL

Every year, BARC's public service season starts strong out of the gate. We provide communications support to three different events each April. Looking back, it's a good sample of all the work we do: hams help different organizations at a variety of events, offering unique services to each.

First is a fundraising walk for the Multiple Sclerosis Society in Boston. Most hams at this event provide route guidance and smooth over logistical issues. This year's event followed a new route, making that support on the course especially important. Rick Savage, KB1LYJ, put together a great team that helped proactively resolve potential issues.

After that comes the BAA 5K and Invitational Mile races, a short prelude to the Boston Marathon. At BAA events we directly support the medical team, helping them deploy to the most effective locations and providing extra lookout for any medical needs. Ten thousand runners were at this year's 5K, the largest field ever, and we also supported a Tribute Run for people affected by the bombings at last year's Marathon.

The last event in April is the Run of the Charles, a canoe and kayak race to support the Charles River Watershed Association. Hams at this event call in on-site registrations, report rules violations, and help keep track of teams to ensure they make it safely from start to finish. That's a lot of traffic to juggle, all of it with different priorities and deadlines, but this year's team worked together to make it sound effortless.

This is my second year serving as BARC's public service coordinator. The longer I do it, the better I understand how much this work is a team effort. We need help from all kinds of hams—whether they're event organizers, repeater trustees, or reporting issues on the course at an event—in order to give the best help to these organizations and our community. No contribution is small, and I can't give enough thanks to all the volunteers who have helped us at these events.

And it's not just me. Many participants at these events, whether walkers, runners, or kayakers, make a point to thank me and other hams for volunteering. Public service events are the best way I know to put your radio skills to use for your community, and you can make a difference even if you're a Technician with only a handheld—that's how I got started! Repeater Committee Report-- Joe Harris, N1QD, Repeater Trustee

In the past few months, the repeater committee has made some major updates and changes to the club's repeater systems.

First I am pleased to announce that the club's **UHF** repeater has returned to the airwaves after being off for over two years. The repeater is a **Motorola XPR8300** operating at **443.550 MHz** with a positive offset, and a PL tone of **110.9Hz** on the input and output. Due to restrictions from PAVE PAWS, the repeater is currently running at 5 watts into the feedline. Still, early reports are that it hears exceptionally well in the Boston area, even if it does not have the strongest output signal. The UHF repeater should easily be serviceable for local public service events. Please note that the UHF repeater does not transmit PL on the ID, so you may only hear the beginning of the CW ID before your radio squelch closes.

Next, I would like to announce that the club's VHF repeater has been replaced with a new Vertex VXR-7000. The frequency and tone remain unchanged at 145.23 MHz with a negative offset and a PL tone of 88.5Hz on the input and output.

I would like to thank the other members of the repeater committee: Linda, NA1I was instrumental in making the arrangements to access the repeater site. Mark, KB1EKN helped immensely with testing and installation.

At this point, BARC's two repeaters are back to normal operations. These are **YOUR** repeaters, so please try them out, and make some QSOs. Signal reports are always welcome (send to <n1qd@n1qd.org>).

Hurricane Watch Net Seeks Net Control Operators - The ARRL Letter, May 8, 2014



The Hurricane Watch Net (<www.hwn.org>) needs additional net control operators. Hurricane Season in the Atlantic begins June 1 and ends November 30; in the Eastern Pacific, it runs from May 15 until November 30. The Hurricane Watch Net activates on 14.325 MHz when an Atlantic Basin hurricane is within 300 miles of landfall, or at the request of the National Hurricane Center (<www.nhc.noaa.gov>) in Miami. HWN Manager Bobby Graves, KB5HAV, said the net has been getting everything in place for its 50th straight season, and that includes recruiting well-qualified, experienced net control operators who can effectively communicate with the hurricane-prone areas of Eastern Canada, the US East Coast, the Gulf of Mexico, Central America, and the Caribbean.

"We are especially looking for bilingual operators, as we recognize that some Latin American operators hesitate to check in and send reports to us, if they aren't fluent in English," Graves said. "The Hurricane Watch Net relies on volunteer operators -- our members -- who serve as our net control stations. These volunteers are hams who have above-average stations and are willing to commit their time to operating in support of the HWN's mission during net activations."

Graves conceded that net sessions can be "long, and, at times, very stressful." He noted that while the HWN primarily operates on 14.325 MHz, it is also looking for volunteers who can handle net control duties on the low end of the 40 meter phone band. "When 20 meters fades away in the evening," he said, "we lose the ability to effectively communicate with our reporting stations or the National Hurricane Center."

Net control operators must be HWN members, but radio amateurs do not need to be HWN members to participate in the net as reporting stations. HWN participants provide observed or measured weather reports, or relay assistance as required by the net control station.


Quarterly Business Meetings -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA

- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
