## Message from the President - Joe Chapman, NV1W

On Friday I was poised to bag W1AW/5 in Louisiana on 20m CW. There wasn't too much of a pileup, and nothing like the free-for-all W1AW/5 spawned on 20m SSB the next day, so in sending my call I had high hopes my five watts would punch through to the Bayou. Then, all the sudden, in the words of Emeril, BAM! Complete radio silence. Nada. Not even noise. As it turned out a feedline lead had broken and the choke balun was now a bal-none. It was easily remedied by the venerable repair technique of sending \$25 to Buddipole for a new one.

With the earnest hope that this is not a sign of what summer has in store, I am happy to announce that plans for Field Day are well underway. I want to encourage everyone to participate, even if you can only drop by for a few hours. Helping set up and tear down the station, in particular, is a valuable learning experience that I recommend to all.

Our hosts at the Bare Cove Fire Museum in Hingham will be Mark Duff, KB1EKN, and Geri Duff, KB1ISG. If you're planning on coming, particularly if you want to eat or stay overnight, please drop a note to Mark at emgmgt@comcast.net. If you wish to operate and have never done so at a club event, please contact me at nv1w@arrl.net in advance. While we want to encourage participation, we are also obliged to see that the station is used in a legal and courteous manner. There will be a six meter rig, so we can accommodate Technician licensees, subject of course to the whims of the "magic band."

Weather permitting, we will be attempting a satellite contact this year, with a simple station and a handheld VHF/UHF yagi. The satellite passes predicted for Field Day are not great, but some of them look promising with maximum elevations around 45 degrees and fifteen minute windows.

I would be remiss if I didn't thank everyone involved in planning and setting up for Field Day. It's a complicated event and one that we do well, thanks to a lot of work and accumulated knowledge. I am also grateful for the participation of our better operators, not only for the points they accumulate, but for the example they furnish for us all.

Join us in Hingham, and may your choke baluns live long and prosper.

**Field Day:** The club decided to publicize this year's Field Day in the local media. A decision was made to provide lunch for the people that help set up Field Day on Saturday.

The meeting adjourned at 2113.

## Amateur Radio "Dry Spell" Aboard ISS Ends - The ARRL Letter, May 29, 2014



Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) school contacts and any incidental, casual operation from the station have been on hold because no licensed crew members have been aboard the ISS since May 12. That situation ended this week, when Flight Engineer Alexander Gerst, KF5ONO, of the European Space Agency, Flight Engineer Reid Wiseman of NASA, and *Soyuz* Commander Max Suraev arrived at the ISS after a May 28 launch from the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Kazakhstan. Russia has threatened to exclude US astronauts from *Soyuz* flights because of US sanctions in the wake of Russia's annexation of Crimea. Scheduled ARISS contacts are expected to resume in July. Wiseman, Suraev, and Gerst will remain aboard the station until mid-November. -- NASA


## Quarterly Business Meetings -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA

- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
