## Message from the President - Joe Chapman, NV1W

Like many hams my age, I first got interested in radio through shortwave listening as a teenager. It had started innocently enough when I discovered that I could pull in distant AM radio stations late at night. At a hamfest I managed to find an army surplus general coverage receiver the size of a modern microwave oven that didn't eat too deeply into my summerjob savings and bought a copy of the World Radio TV Handbook.

Soon I was staying up late trying to catch sporadic transmissions from Radio Berzerkistan, cryptanalyzing numbers stations, and being fooled by noise and lousy propagation into thinking a VoA broadcast was coming from someplace exotic.

Among the stronger stations, Radio Moscow was a favorite of mine, since you could occasionally hear them say something especially ludicrous. My all-time favorite (KB1EKN take note) was the claim that the Russians had invented the fire engine, and that's why they're painted red. They also loved sending propaganda mailings, which in frequency and predictability of content weren't all that different from Levenger catalogs.

While I certainly find Logbook of the World convenient, something about receiving cards in the mail still appeals to me, so it was with a familiar sense of excited anticipation that I sent out a handful of cards to DXCC entities I still need following the last International DX contest. I've been using the cover/return envelope sets from K3FN, the Airmail Postage guy, with their retro red and blue airmail border, which just make you want to go watch black and white TV and vote for Eisenhower. Maybe I'll even get some of them back!

On the topic of cards, our April meeting at the Clay Center will feature Eric Williams, KV1J, who will talk about his DXpeditions to the French island of Miquelon. Eric also co-manages the region 1 QSL bureau, so if you've always wanted to know how the bureaus work, he'll be able to answer your questions. If we're lucky and the clouds stay away, Bob K5TEC may even open up the telescope, though at this point I'll count us lucky if it isn't snowing. This will be an excellent opportunity to come back to a BARC general meeting if you haven't been to one in a while. Parking is easy at the Clay Center, the Red Sox are out of town that day, and a good time will be had by all.

Perhaps I'll bring my latest Berzerkistani QSL along to show. Unless it gets damaged by being crammed into my mailbox with all those Levenger catalogs.

## Signal Reports Wanted for 145.23 and 443.55 – Joe Harris, N1QD

Members may recall last fall when the club solicited signal reports for the 145.23 repeater. At that time we had just installed a Laird FG1443 to replace the Andrew DB224 that had been damaged the pervious winter. The reports we received were not indicative of the excellent performance we want the club's flagship repeater to be known for. With this in mind, the club passed a motion to allocate funds to purchase a new DB224. The antenna was received in early October and installed on October 24. Initial reports have been **very** positive, but we have only heard from some of the frequent users. In addition, the UHF repeater has been on the air since spring, but has not been particularly active.

- Your current license and a photocopy for the ARRL, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
