## **SKYWARN Training in Belmont on November 18**



The National Weather Service (NWS) in Taunton, Massachusetts (<a href="http://www.weather.gov/box">http://www.weather.gov/box</a>) will be sponsoring a severe weather spotter training session, part of its SKYWARN program, in Belmont, Massachusetts. The class will be on Wednesday, November 18, 2015 from 700 PM to 930 PM. It will be held at Belmont High School – Main Auditorium, 221 Concord Avenue, Belmont, MA.

The session is open to the public at no charge. Amateur Radio Operators, Emergency managers, police, fire, and other first responders are encouraged to attend. Everyone age 16 and older who stays to complete the training will be able to become a trained NWS weather spotter.

The training session includes a two-hour thirty-minute computer-based presentation, which discusses the development of thunderstorms, the criteria for "severe" thunderstorms, as well as the cloud features associated with severe thunderstorms and tornados. Additional information will be presented about winter storms and proper snow measurement and reporting of coastal flooding, river, stream, and urban flooding and rainfall measurements. The session will also present the procedure for reporting weather information to the National Weather Service. Safety procedures for the various forms of summer severe weather (severe thunderstorms, tornadoes and lightning), winter storms, hurricanes and flooding will also be covered in the training session. Anyone attending should bring a pen or pencil and bringing a notebook is optional.

No pre-registration is required. ## Minutes from the October 2015 General Meeting – Joe Chapman, NV1W

A business meeting was held at the beginning of the General Meeting on October 15 at 7:30 pm in Brookline. Voting members present: N1QD, KB1ISG, KB1EKN, NV1W, AB1RL, WA1IDA, NA1I, N1ICN, KB1TIC, K1QK. Visitors: KC1EKJ.

President Joe Harris, N1QD, made announcements concerning the SKYWARN training class in Belmont on November 18, the General Meeting on November 19, SKYWARN Recognition Day on December 5, and the BARC Holiday Party on January 10 at the Stockyard in Allston.

Joe, N1QD, described the current state of the repeaters:

- We need to replace the UHF antenna as the owner of the current antenna has asked us to return it. N1QD mentioned the possibility of getting a directional antenna which would allow us to aim a null in the direction of the PAVE PAWS radar on Cape Cod. He said that a commercial grade antenna would cost approximately \$1000.
- To support DMR, the current UHF machine requires a repair of \$1400, approximately two-thirds the cost of a new repeater. N1QD mentioned that we may be able to secure outside funding via either the NEDECN network or NEARFEST.

A motion was made and passed to authorize the Repeater committee to spend up to \$1000, half from the repeater fund and half from the general fund, at their discretion to obtain a new UHF antenna.

Bob, WA1IDA, noted that our status as an ARRL Special Service club expired several years ago. N1QD will investigate what it will take to renew our status and report at the December business meeting.

Partners Health Care has requested a presentation by the club on amateur radio. Blake, K1BTH, Brett, AB1RL, and Bob, WA1IDA will investigate further and make a recommendation at a future meeting.

## BARC to Participate in SKYWARN Recognition Day 2015 - Mark Duff, KB1EKN

On December 5th, 2015, and for the 13th consecutive year, BARC will once again participate in SKYWARN Recognition Day. SRD is a joint event support by the ARRL and the National Weather Service where weather stations and weather buffs from across the country contact each other for fun and to promote the SKYWARN Program. Our station, WX1BHO, will be located at the summit of Great Blue Hill in Milton MA.

For several decades, hams have assisted the National Weather Service by providing real-time reports of severe weather and storm conditions. Although the NWS operates a network of 120 Doppler radars to track severe storms, at greater ranges weather radar has a difficult time sampling conditions close to the ground. The information radio operators located near a storm provide plays a key role in aiding forecasters. Stations will exchange signal reports, location and a brief description of the current weather at their respective locations ("sunny," "partly cloudy," "windy," etc.). BARC will be on the air from approximately 0900 to 1500 local time.

The event itself is a great way in a low-key environment to make HF contacts and get your feet wet in the HF Spectrum.

In past years we have endured all kinds of weather including warm and cold days, clear and cloudy days, and yes, even a blizzard. Access to the summit is gained by a 20 minute hike from the base of Great Blue Hill located on Route 138 next to the DCR Trailside Museum or (if you arrive early in the day) by car. ## Holiday Cheer: The Marconi Wireless - Joe Chapman, NV1W



I recently gave a talk to the Hampden County Radio Association on "Bicycling and Ham Radio", celebrating two hobbies that I enjoy in combination as well as separately. In the spirit of combining radio and another hobby, and in time for the holidays, here's a recipe for the Marconi Wireless cocktail, an applejack variant of the Manhattan. To be honest, this drink is a little sweet for my taste, but as that means I'm unlikely to have two at a sitting, that's probably a good thing. One wants to drink responsibly and never, never, unless Bouvet Island suddenly comes up at 599 on 40 meters


and you have no choice, operate under the influence.

According to my friend Naomi Levy, bar manager at Eastern Standard in Boston, the Marconi Wireless was created at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York, probably in 1902 when Marconi received an award from the American Institute of Electrical Engineers for his work on radio. (He also stayed at the hotel in 1912 when he testified at the Senate hearings on the Titanic disaster, but the mood would have been decidedly less festive.) What follows is my interpretation of the drink as given in *The Old Waldorf-Astoria Bar Book* (New York, 1935).

Stir over ice: 2 oz/60 ml Laird's Bonded Apple Brandy (Laird's Applejack if the Bonded stuff is unavailable), 1 oz/30 ml Italian sweet vermouth, and 2 generous dashes Regan's No. 6 Orange Bitters. Strain into a conical cocktail glass and garnish with a Luxardo cherry. *Cin-cin!* 

## Coming in 2016: National Parks on the Air - Joe Chapman, NV1W

The ARRL has announced a National Parks on the Air program for next year. "Throughout 2016, Amateur Radio will be helping the National Park Service celebrate their 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Hams from across the country will activate NPS units, promote the National Park Service and showcase amateur radio to the public." #### **BARC Volunteer Exam Sessions**



- Your current license and a photocopy for the ARRL, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
