## Equipment Review: K1EL Code Practice Oscillator Kit - Joe Chapman, NV1W



I had a literature professor at MIT who was infamous for saying "uhhhhh..." in every other sentence. What made it notable was that when she said, "uhhhhh..." it came out as an alarming, loud, nasal buzz. I later found out she was a former spy and was teaching at MIT under an assumed name, the sort of thing I expect from my beloved alma mater.

The most common circuit for a code practice oscillator is built around a 555 timer chip. It has the virtue of being inexpensive, but it also sounds like Prof. Bmzklfrpza after she drank a half bottle of Scotch and smoked a pack of unfiltered Camels. It produces a square wave, which when fed into an  $8\Omega$  speaker produces the sound of an  $8\Omega$  speaker in pain.

Steve, K1EL, to the rescue. He offers a \$29 code practice oscillator that produces a nice clean sine wave that you can adjust for both pitch and volume, and it's a joy to listen to after the drunken ravings of a 555. It's a kit, but a very easy build with large components and a generously spaced circuit board. I put mine together in less than half an hour.

There's no enclosure. You have to supply power (I use a 9V battery attached to one of these wonderful doodads from Adafruit: <a href="https://www.adafruit.com/product/80">https://www.adafruit.com/product/80</a>) and if you want to hear the output on something other than headphones you'll need a powered speaker. The key plugs into an RCA jack for some reason, so you'll probably need an adapter for that as well.

There's a feature that lets you string multiple CPO's together for classes and the like. I've never tried this.

It's a fine piece of equipment, and if you're learning to use oddball keys like a sideswiper or a bug I think it's invaluable. I don't miss being reminded of "and now, uhhhhh..., my favorite author, Heming- uhhhhh...-way..." every time I go to practice sending.

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
