When You Do A Good Job, It Is Noticed

Our skills as communicators for public events are well known. So well known, in fact, that directors of the newest Boston-area events have called upon us hams to support public safety even before the events are fully planned. Here are brief descriptions of two brand new and two repeat events coming later this year. Because these four events take place in a six-week period, we must plan carefully and begin recruiting immediately.

The new events are not only firsts for Boston, but are starting as world-class. It is expected that much publicity will be focused on them. Your help is needed. Please volunteer for as many events as you can (without exhausting yourself). Keep your batteries dry.

First will be the new Boston Triathlon. Anywhere in the world it is an exciting and very demanding race. In urban Boston it will be a further test of strength and will. Designed to professional standards, the swim-bike-run will be held on Sunday, 2 **September**. The problem for us is that this is Labor Day weekend, so extra effort must go into getting enough hams. A bit of relief is provided by the schedule which expects the entire event to go from 0700 to 1100. We need to make a good showing because this is planned to become an annual event.

Next will be the WGBH Ice Cream FunFest. We have been supporting this for many years to protect the safety of the thousands of visitors. BARC also uses our booth space to promote public awareness of ham radio. In past years we have found hidden hams and also introduced many people to our hobby.

One of the added benefits of our participation is to sample all the ice cream you can eat (it's really worth it). This takes place on **Saturday and Sunday, 8 and 9 September** at the WGBH studio area in Brighton. Hams are needed on either or both days - for communications and/or meeting the public.

Another repeat event is the *Jimmy Fund Marathon Walk*. Not nearly as intense as the Boston Marathon, it covers the full 26 miles of the Marathon course from Hopkinton to Boston. There are 13 Walker Support Stations along the route, plus the very special patient walk and the finish. This walk is on **Sunday**, 30 **September**. Because the walk is lengthy, no assignment is more than a few hours.

Suddenly we have another new world-class event right here in Boston. To compliment the Boston Marathon, the Boston Athletic Association (BAA) has devised a *Half Marathon*. The circular 13.1-mile course will be run along the "Emerald Necklace," entirely within the city. Already, notice has been taken and entry applications are coming from around the world. The Half Marathon will be held on **Sunday**, 14 October, and is also expected to become an annual event.

Note that all of these events are within easy reach of local repeaters. Your hand-held 2-meter and 70-centimeter radio will do just fine. A day's worth of battery power will do the trick.

ARRL Approves Dues Increase

Meeting in Irving, Texas, January 19 and 20, the ARRL Board of Directors voted to increase membership dues from \$34 to \$39 annually for full members younger than 65, and from \$28 to \$34 for full members 65 and older. The dues hike goes into effect July 1, 2001. The last ARRL dues increase was in July 1997.

Recently, John (WN9T - the licensee of the 145.23 BARC machine) has decided to make his 447.175 UHF repeater an official BARC repeater. This machine is located right next to the .23 repeater and has similar coverage (actually better in some areas.) The repeater has a negative offset and a PL of 110.9 Hz.

Please feel free to use this machine as you would use .23. In the future, we may link it with .23, at least for certain nets.

We have also decided to standardize on 147.42 as the BARC regular simplex frequency. In case of an emergency (or when trying to find people at a hamfest or show), you can expect to find BARC people here.

- \$10.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests).
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$10 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for a single \$10 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

Tentative operating frequencies are: Worldwide downlink for voice and packet, 145.80 MHz; worldwide packet uplink, 145.99 MHz; Region 1 (Europe) voice uplink: 145.20 MHz; Region 2 and 3 voice uplink, 144.49 MHz. Crew members may use their personal call signs or one of the "club station" call signs issued for ISS use--NA1SS, RZ3DZR, or DL0ISS.


The Keplerian elements bulletin from ARRL now includes data for the International Space Station.
