Public Service Awareness

As I sat at Net Control for the Monster Challenge Triathlon on Sunday, 1 September, I recognized many things I heard then and at other events. The Triathlon went smoothly, but there were a few things that we should always be careful to avoid.

First, before starting a transmission, think about what you want to say, and then start the transmission. It is not necessary to make lengthy transmissions to say something that could be communicated in one or two sentences. Second, be sure that your communication is really relevant, not an observation of interest only to you. The Net Control operator has enough to deal with concerning necessary traffic.

Third, always be as polite as possible. You never know who may be listening to your transmission at another station or on a scanner, etc. Often, event organizers will be present at our Net Control, or a key person hears the radio of the shadow assigned to them. We want to be showing our best side at all times.

Finally, it is increasingly asked that because of event security, we hams make firm commitments to supporting the event. This has become evident at the larger and urban events lately. If you volunteer to work an event, make every attempt to be there. If you are not going to be able to keep the commitment, notify the coordinator as soon as possible. When we tell an event organizer that we will be able to provide a number of operators to meet their needs, we must provide that number. It puts Amateur Radio in a bad light when we can't provide what we've committed to, and our credibility suffers tremendously.

These are common problems that we all encounter. A regular reminder can help us all.

Second Annual Half Marathon

As a complement to the Boston Marathon, the BAA started a new event last year - a Half Marathon run almost entirely in Boston. We have been asked again to lend communications support for this event. The 2002 Half Marathon will be held on Sunday, 13 October from mid-morning to early afternoon. The course runs from Clemente Park in the Fenway, along the Jamaicaway and Arborway, to a turnaround at the Franklin Park Zoo, and back again. As we did last year, 2-meter/70-cm hand-helds should do the job. An antenna better than a "rubber duck," sufficient batteries, and an earplug are your best friends.

Bass Booted?

A cargo container appears destined to replace "space tourist" hopeful Lance Bass, KG4UYY, on an October mission to the International Space Station. Associated Press, CNN and Reuters reported that the pop singer--part of the group 'N Sync--will not be going into space after all. It's still not clear, however, that this is the final word on the on again/off again relationship between Bass and the Russian space program.

Last week, Bass passed his Technician Amateur Radio license test in preparation for doing some Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) school contacts during his planned ISS tour. The FCC granted the new call sign to the Orlando, Florida, resident on September 5. News accounts this week reported, however, that Bass has been removed from the roster of the Soyuz taxi mission crew and has left the Star City, Russia, cosmonaut training center--although he's still said to be in the Moscow area.

Still on the Soyuz flight schedule are Russian commander Sergei Zalyotin and Belgian flight engineer Frank De Winne, ON1DWN. Russian Space Agency officials said this week that the commercial consortium backing the Bass adventure still has not come up with any of the estimated \$20 million payment, despite several deadline extensions. Bass who's relying on the corporate sponsors to pay for his fare as a space tourist, began his training in July at Star City and had just returned to Russia after a week at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Bass's handlers are blaming the nonpayment on paperwork problems and say the latest setback is temporary and negotiations are continuing. The Russians are standing firm that Bass is out of the program. They have said they'll now send a container of additional equipment instead of the pop star. The 23-year-old Bass has been hoping to become the youngest person ever to journey into space.

During his Amateur Radio training at Johnson Space Center in Texas, Nick Lance, KC5SWM--who instructed Bass in getting his ticket--also exposed him to a simulation of what he might expect to hear in space while making casual QSOs. "Frank Bauer [KA3HDO, the ARISS Board chairman] and I felt it was important for him to experience what it would be like responding to thousands of calls simultaneously, so I arranged for pileup training for Lance with my students acting as the ground stations," Lance said.

With his wife Renee, KC5VMA, serving as control operator for the training event, a couple of dozen students called while Bass tried to copy and respond to each one. "Lance was initially overcome by all the call signs, then settled down after making several contacts and did well himself," Lance said.

Bass later stopped by to say hello to the students who had just helped train him. "Everyone was thrilled," Lance said. "Then we went back to our studies and Lance Bass took the exam and passed.

Ham-Led Team Attempting Transatlantic Model Airplane Flight

A team of model airplane enthusiasts led by Maynard Hill, W3FQF, is attempting a record-breaking crossing of the Atlantic by a model aircraft. A model plane dubbed "The Spirit of Butts Farm" was launched August 20 and was on its way to Ireland. Monitoring the flight, TAM-3, the third in a series, from Newfoundland, Canada, Hill's team reports the plane was last heard from August 21 at 0428 UTC. "We are still uncertain what happened," said a terse announcement on the team's Web site.

The Transatlantic Model Aircraft--or TAM--project is Hill's brainchild as the president of the Society for Technical Aeromodel Research. Hill and his design team have spent four years on the ambitious project. The TAM aircraft are hand-launched and guided to an altitude of 1500 feet by radio remote control. Upon reaching that altitude, a sophisticated GPS-based autopilot system takes over. The aircraft sends periodic position reports to the flight team, and these are posted on the TAM Web site http://tam.plannet21.com/index.html

The first two TAMs failed soon after launch. The last position report for TAM-3 indicated that it had completed better than one-

fourth of its journey before contact with the airplane was lost. TAM-4 will be the final attempt--at least for now.

A successful flight would mark the first transatlantic crossing by a true model airplane--an aircraft weighing 11 pounds or less with an engine with no more than 10 cc displacement, as specified by the Federation Aeronautique Internationale (FAI) **http://www.fai.org**. It would also set a new world record for straight-line distance by a radio-controlled, piston-powered model airplane.



Special Event Station K4P To Mark First Anniversary Of Pentagon Attack:

Deanna Lutz, K7DID, reports that special event station K4P will operate from the Pentagon starting 0400 UTC Wednesday, September 11 through 0400 UTC Thursday, September 12, to mark the first anniversary of the terrorist attack. "Given the added security restrictions on that day, only a handful of us will be active there, however," Lutz said. K4P will operate from the Pentagon and from other sites in the Washington, DC, area. Activity will be on 80 through 10 meters, SSB and CW. QSL with an SASE to K7DID, PO Box 70071, Washington, DC 20024.
