It's a Simplex Net!

The SWAT net normally meets on the 145.23 repeater on Friday nights at 9pm. However, the month of May has five Fridays. For something a little different (and to practice what to do when the repeater doesn't work) there will be a simplex SWAT net at 9pm on Friday May 30,2003. The net will be held on 147.42 simplex. If you can't hear anyone, check on the 145.23 repeater, someone will be listening to direct folks to the simplex net. Remember that when operating simplex you will need to turn off your tone squelch and may need to manually open the squelch (to a dull roar) to be able to hear other stations. Just like sideband! Please join us.

May General Meeting

At the April General Meeting on Thursday May 15, 2003 at 7:00 P.M, BARC's guest speaker will be Mike Goldberg, K1LJN who will discuss the ARRL Official Observer program in Eastern Massachusetts.

The Official Observer "OO" program has operated for more than a half century. In this time, OO appointees have assisted thousands of amateurs whose signals, or operating procedures, were not in compliance with the FCC regulations. The function of the OO is to listen for amateurs who might otherwise come to the attention of the FCC and to advise them by mail of the irregularity observed. The OO program is, in essence, for the benefit of amateurs who want to be helped. OO's must meet high standards of expertise and experience. It is the job of the OO Coordinator to recruit, supervise and direct the efforts of OO's in the section, and to report their activity monthly to the Section Manager, and Headquarters.

Mike is a seasoned ham and has been licensed since 1950. He is retired but has held numerous engineering and/or technical positions in the broadcast and commercial radio industries. His major ham interests include VHF, UHF, and SHF. The last few years have been spent assisting fellow hams comply with the rules as a member of the Amateur Auxiliary to the FCC, through the ARRL OO program.

In June we'll be having a discussion on the Internet and ham radio through one of our newest members, Ramon, K1XT. With increasing numbers of ham operators looking to include the Echolink and IRLP into their stations, Ramon should be able to shed some light on this process. There are no meetings in July and August and in September we are hoping to have someone from ICOM talk about the new products released at Dayton. There may be some giveaways as well (no promises though!). In October we hope to have a presentation on the new standards for broadcast radio and the conversion to digital mode by WBZ 1030 AM. Finally, our November meeting will be a hands-on meeting with Mike Ardai, N1IST, showing us how to make cables. Bring your soldering irons! December will be the BARC holiday party and our next presentation will be in January 2004.

The General meetings are held on the third Thursday of each month at the Salvation Army second floor auditorium, 147 Columbus Avenue, at the corner of Berkeley and Columbus. Our meetings are convenient to public transportation. Nearest T stations are Back Bay on the Orange line (exit the rear of the station) and Arlington on the Green line (use the Berkeley Street exit).

Parking is available; the entrance to the parking lot is from Columbus Ave. (across the street from the firehouse). It is also T accessible; the nearest T stations are Back Bay on the Orange and Purple lines (exit the rear of the station by the bus way and walk down Columbus) and Copley or Arlington on the Green line (use the Berkeley Street exit). People arriving after 7:15 p.m. need to ring the bell at the door to be admitted, as the door is locked then.

- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$12.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests).
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$12 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for a single \$12 fee.
