First Women's Triathlon

First time events do have their problems, but careful planning by experienced managers can minimize the difficulties. Fortunately,

things came together and worked very well. The request for ham communication support gave us only a couple of weeks to survey the site and get a team together.

The Reebok Women's Triathlon on 13 July was one of four nationally to raise money for the Ovarian Cancer Research Institute. Over 400 triathletes participated to swim, bike and run. Hams monitored the course for the safety of the athletes.

The location, on the south side of Great Blue Hill, and entirely around the base of the hill proved to be in the shadow from Boston ham and commercial UHF repeaters - only our Boston VHF repeater was usable at all points of the course. Cell phone coverage was poor and a portable commercial UHF was needed.

Triathlon Agony - Again

The Monster Challenge Triathlon, which was run for the second time in Boston last year, continues to be an international success. We have been asked again this year to coordinate emergency and safety communications support. The formal name for the event is the *Monster Challenge Tri-Boston*. It is sponsored by Monster.com for the benefit of the AIDS Action Committee.

Anywhere in the world a triathlon is an exciting and very demanding race. In urban Boston it is a further test of strength and determination. Designed to professional standards, the swimbike-run will be held on **Sunday, 31 August**. The Olympic-class triathletes will swim one mile, bike 25 miles, and run 6.2 miles. The course is laid out in Boston harbor, downtown Boston and Cambridge, and in the Boston seaport. There are a number of

hazardous and confusing locations that we are assigned to monitor.

The problem for us is that this is Labor Day weekend, so extra effort must go into getting enough hams - we need your help. A bit of relief is provided by the schedule which expects the entire event to go from **0630 to 1100**, so the rest of the day is free. Here's a ham public service event where the reward might be better than the job. WGBH, the public TV channels 2 and 44, and FM radio, will hold their annual Ice Cream FunFest on **Saturday**, **13 September**, at and around the WGBH station on Western Avenue in Brighton. We will start a bit earlier and run a bit later, but on Saturday only.

As in past years, thousands of people are expected, but they will all be loaded into the one day. We have been asked to provide communications for the safety and management of the crowd and their vehicles. We plan a revised strategy for parking lot coverage so we can be more effective and efficient. It's a compact area, so 2-meter simplex HTs can be used.

A great advantage for us is that BARC is given free booth space to promote public awareness of ham radio. In past years our booth has introduced many people to our hobby and also stirred interest in several inactive hams. About 16 to 18 hams will be needed for communications and/or meeting the public.

Although such a good cause (and good publicity for us) doesn't need it, here's the good part: all volunteers get to eat all the ice cream you can consume (urp!). The ice cream is provided by 5-6 manufacturers, so you can make comparative tests (urp, urp!).

You Vacationing in the Wilderness this Summer?

ARRL - "Amateur Radio Emergency Service, ARES Field Manual", page 76

The Wilderness protocol (see page 101, August 1995 QST) calls for wilderness hams to announce their presence on, and to monitor, the national calling frequencies for five minutes beginning at the top of the hour, every three hours from 7 AM to 7 PM while in the back country.

A ham in a remote location may be able to relay emergency information through another wilderness ham who has better access to a repeater.

Calling Frequencies: 52.525, 146.52, 223.50, 446.00, 1294.50 MHz.

Repeaters: 145.23 (-) PL 88.5 447.175 (-) PL 110.9

- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$12 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for a single \$12 fee.

ARRL Web Pages for Kids

Harmonics Web pages open up the possibilities of ham radio for youngsters:

An eight-year-old kid's first crystal set, built with the help of his grandfather. Hearing radio signals without electricity. That was how many veteran Amateur Radio operators were introduced to the magic of radio in past eras. The new century offers many avenues - including the Internet - through which youngsters can experience the same magic.

With that in mind, ARRL Field and Educational Services introduces the Harmonics Web pages http://www.arrl.org/FandES/ead/youth/

"The mission of the new Harmonics kids' pages is to expose children to the possibilities of Amateur Radio, not clobber them over the head with a pile of technical information," said Educational Programs Coordinator Jean Wolfgang, WB3IOS. The Web pages currently feature the first of a number of ageappropriate activities for kids. Web visitors can play games, download informative printouts to color, read news articles about other kids involved with ham radio, work puzzles, click on live links, listen to audio samples of Morse code and space station contacts and much more.

Throughout the site, kids are greeted by colorful cartoon "hamsters" who explore the world of Amateur Radio along with the young people visiting the site. The pages target kids aged 5 to 15. Harmonics invites them to get acquainted with the basic concepts of Amateur Radio through immediate personal interaction and by discovering how other kids are using ham radio for personal communication and to expand their exploration of science and technology. Wolfgang says Harmonics will include more games and a QSL card template with drag-and-drop interactive design in the near future.


