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Storm Shelters Project Pays Dividends For Oklahoma Club

An Oklahoma ham radio club's initiative has paid off by helping the community and enhancing public recognition for Amateur Radio. Chuck Kanach, KC5EZS, who's vice president of the Choctaw Amateur Radio Club http://k5car.tripod.com/carc, says his club proposed last year to locate the precise position of storm shelters in the tornado-prone community to enable them to be found later--after a storm. CARC, an ARRL-affiliated club, got the okay this summer.

Members used their own GPS units and kept in touch via ham radio and cell phone as they used an initial list of 137 addresses from the city to track down, pinpoint and inventory the exact location of each storm cellar. Before they finished, the list had grown by another two dozen.

"We worked in teams of two and were able to locate 154 of these shelters within a six-week period," said Kanach, who headed up the project http://k5car.tripod.com/carc/id1.html. When the club finally turned over its list, Fire Chief Loren Bumgarner handed the club another dozen to locate.

"We have also been asked to locate storm shelters for neighboring cities, Kanach said. "It looks like we will be staying busy for a while."

The success of the project--and ham radio's contribution in the aftermath of last May's tornadoes in Oklahoma--has encouraged municipal officials to take ham radio more seriously as an emergency resource, Kanach said.

"I am now on first-name basis with our city's emergency coordinator," Kanach said. "He knows that we have people in our club concerned about our city and our people. He also knows the type of services we could provide."

Kanach believes part of the reason for the project's successwhich got local media coverage--was not waiting for the city to ask but taking the initiative to propose the project first. "The City of Choctaw and everyone we came in contact with now knows about the Choctaw Amateur Radio Club," he said.

While the ham radio part is straight forward, the complexities of an urban course make our services a vital part of protecting the runners and spectators.

The 2003 Half Marathon will be held on Sunday, 12 October from early morning to late morning. The course runs from Clemente Park in the Fenway, along the Jamaicaway and Arborway, to a turnaround at the Franklin Park Zoo, and back again. As we did last year, 2-meter/70-cm hand-helds should do the job. An antenna better than a "rubber duck," sufficient batteries, and an earplug are your best friends.

- \$12.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests).
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$12 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for a single \$12 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

Harmonics Web pages open up the possibilities of ham radio for youngsters:

An eight-year-old kid's first crystal set, built with the help of his grandfather. Hearing radio signals without electricity. That was how many veteran Amateur Radio operators were introduced to the magic of radio in past eras. The new century offers many avenues - including the Internet - through which youngsters can experience the same magic.

With that in mind, ARRL Field and Educational Services introduces the Harmonics Web pages

"The mission of the new Harmonics kids' pages is to expose children to the possibilities of Amateur Radio, not clobber them over the head with a pile of technical information," said Educational Programs Coordinator Jean Wolfgang, WB3IOS. The Web pages currently feature the first of a number of age-appropriate activities for kids. Web visitors can play games, download informative printouts to color, read news articles about other kids involved with ham radio, work puzzles, click on live links, listen to audio samples of Morse code and space station contacts and much more.

Throughout the site, kids are greeted by colorful cartoon "hamsters" who explore the world of Amateur Radio along with the young people visiting the site. The pages target kids aged 5 to 15. Harmonics invites them to get acquainted with the basic concepts of Amateur Radio through immediate personal interaction and by discovering how other kids are using ham radio for personal communication and to expand their exploration of science and technology. Wolfgang says Harmonics will include more games and a QSL card template with drag-and-drop interactive design in the near future.


