SKYWARN is a program sponsored by the National Weather Service (NWS) to increase information regarding surface weather conditions during critical weather events. SKYWARN is supported by a well-organized ham radio activity. Hams play an important part in the identification of local conditions and the reporting to NWS, however, it is not necessary to be an Amateur Radio operator to take this valuable training.

Wherever You Go There's Weather

Wherever you go in the US, it will be difficult to be out of range of a NOAA All-Hazards Weather Radio. More than 860 transmitters cover all 50 states, with 34 in New England. Each station continually broadcasts the local weather observations and forecasts from a nearby National Weather Service office. When necessary, they also send out alerts to warn the public of potentially life-threatening conditions.

Emergency Communications Workshop

An Emergency Communications Workshop is scheduled for Saturday, 3 April at the South Shore Educational Collaborative in Hingham, from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, including lunch. The facility location is at 90 Industrial Park Road in Hingham (directions below).

This Workshop is presented by the ARES Section Staff through the efforts of Metro Boston ARES District Emergency Coordinator, Mark Duff, KB1EKN. The Workshop will provide background and information for Amateur Radio Operators when needed to respond to a communications emergency. It will feature a comprehensive introduction to emergency communications, and five one-hour training sessions on topics including:

- Overview of the Eastern Massachusetts ARES-RACES-SKYWARN Programs
- Basic Overview of the Incident Command System
- Net Operations
- NTS Traffic Message Handling
- Go Kits
- Interactive Exercises on Field Operations

A one-hour lunch will be provided at no coerced cost to any Amateur who attends.

The topics will be presented by Amateur Radio operators well versed in their subjects. The training is a worthwhile endeavor not just for emergency communicators, but for any ham who wants to learn more about the hobby.

Go 1/8 mile; sign on left says South Shore Park. Take left on Industrial Park Rd. SSEC is down about 1/2 mile on left. Parking is to the left of the building.

From the south: Follow Rt. 3 north to Exit 15, South Hingham South-Weymouth. Stay to the right at the end of the ramp on to Derby St. following the sign to South Weymouth. Go over Rt. 3 and drive 1/8 mile; sign on left says South Shore Park. Take left on Industrial Park Rd. SSEC is down about 1/2 mile on left. Parking is to the left of the building.

The next General meeting of the Boston Amateur Radio Club will be on Thursday, March 18, 2004. At the meeting, Blair Sutherland, Director of Telecommunications for the Massachusetts State Police, will review the MSP 800 MHz trunking system, agency interoperability, and public safety in Massachusetts.

Mr. Sutherland came to the State Police from the Statewide Emergency Telecommunications Board where he was Deputy Director. He and his colleagues oversaw the implementation of the statewide E 911 system in the Commonwealth.

Prior to that he was a long-time employee of Boston EMS where he held both field and operations positions.

The General meetings are held on the third Thursday of each month at the Salvation Army, 147 Columbus Ave, at the corner of Berkeley St in the third floor auditorium.

Our meetings are convenient to public transportation. The nearest **T** stations are Back Bay on the Orange and Purple lines (exit the rear of the station and walk down Columbus), and Copley or Arlington (use the Berkeley St exit) stations on the Green line.

BARC VE Session

The Boston Amateur Radio Club holds its monthly VE session on the second Monday of each month. The next session will be at 7 pm on Monday, January 12, 2004 at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline; Room 110, next to the cafeteria.

If the Brookline public schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be cancelled. Otherwise, the exams will be on the second Monday of each month (first Monday in October due to Columbus Day).

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School Street from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: http://www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif for more info. This map also appears on page 7 of this newsletter.

For those traveling via public transportation, take the "D" branch of the **T** Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician thru Extra, CW and written). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$12.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$12 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for a single \$12 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

Hams Needed For the Multiple Sclerosis Walk

Hams will be needed for the Boston Multiple Sclerosis Walk, which will be held on Sunday, 16 May from mid-morning to midafternoon. We have supported this event for many years, protecting the safety of thousands of walkers, and earning the gratitude of the sponsors.

However, at this writing, the MS Society is facing a significant administrative problem: the venue and route have not yet been selected or approved. The best guess is that some Boston or Cambridge MDC area is likely.

While our team is familiar with most suitable locations in the Greater Boston area, we will have to make a communications review if it is in a location we have not supported before.

Other than the venue, there should be no significant changes from the many years we have assisted this event. We need about 20 hams to staff the checkpoints, the hazardous locations and to shadow the key people. As usual, we would meet for orientation and assignment at 1000 - probably at wherever the Start/Finish is located. We are usually finished before 1430.


