ARRL *E-Mail Forwarding Service* Changes Aim To Improve Traffic Flow

The ARRL E-Mail Forwarding Service, **www.arrl.org/members-only/emailfwd.html**, has instituted several changes to reduce the overall volume of unwanted e-mail traffic while evening out the flow of desired correspondence. One outcome - at least in the short term - has been a reduction in undesired and unsolicited e-mail ("spam") via @arrl.net e-mail addresses. Several Forwarding Service participants have even e-mailed ARRL Headquarters to remark on the improvement. ARRL Chief Financial Officer Barry Shelley, N1VXY, says daily volume on the free-to-ARRL-members service and the number of users - 63,000 and rising - have grown dramatically, requiring some mitigation. Volume was averaging 500,000 messages per day, and on some days, traffic reached nearly one million.

"Changes had to be made, as this volume threatened to overwhelm the resources of the servers that maintain and process the e-mail for the ARRL E-Mail Forwarding Service," Shelley said. "In addition, because of the volume of spam, Internet service providers (ISPs) would periodically refuse to accept messages originating from @arrl.net addresses, mistakenly identifying the Forwarding Service as a spam source."

"We're trying to keep the Forwarding Service viable and at no cost to members," he said.

Among other changes, the Forwarding Service vendor updated its Realtime Black Lists to include many more targeted spam sources. "This should help to somewhat reduce the amount of spam," Shelley explained. He predicted, however, that as spammers figure out how to circumvent the changes, spam levels are likely to rise again.

The Forwarding Service also reduced the amount of time a message remains in a queue on the @arrl.net servers before the sender receives a delivery failure message. Although the vendor adjusted the number of recipients the Forwarding Service server will process at any one time, there is no limit on the number of addressees.

"What it means is that the sending server may have to deliver a given message more than once to reach all intended recipients," he explained. "The idea is to smooth out the flow of messages through the system, reducing the number of messages in the queues as well as eliminating or minimizing delays resulting from a high volume of traffic."

Members can help reduce their vulnerability to spam by not posting their @arrl.net e-mail addresses on public Web sites, Shelley says. But, he adds, as long as spamming continues to be a moneymaker, nothing will eliminate it entirely.

BARC VE Sessions

Please note that BARC will not give VE Exams in July and August because of school renovation.

The Boston Amateur Radio Club holds its monthly VE session on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. Future exam dates are listed below. A map is shown on page 7 of this newsletter.

If the Brookline public schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be cancelled. Otherwise, the exams will be on the second Monday of each month (first Monday in October due to Columbus Day).

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School Street from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: **http://www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif** for more info. This map also appears on page 7 of this newsletter.

For those traveling via public transportation, take the "D" branch of the **T** Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician thru Extra, CW and written). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- *\$12.00* (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$12 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for a single \$12 fee.

W1AW/90 Operates Through 2004

The Hiram Maxim Memorial Station, W1AW, at ARRL Headquarters will identify using a "/90" designator through the end of 2004. The W1AW/90 call sign reflects the 90th anniversary of the League's founding by Maxim and Clarence Tuska in 1914. Operation as W1AW/90 begins April 3. W1AW Station Manager Joe Carcia, NJ1Q, said he'll encourage guest operators to use as many modes as possible, including RTTY, PSK31, satellite and even Hellschreiber.

"Plus, we're going to try for SSTV Worked All States (WAS)," he added. "It'll be tough, but we can do it." A special 90th anniversary QSL card will be available for W1AW/90 contacts.

Self-addressed, stamped return envelopes should accompany all QSL requests. In addition, all contacts with W1AW/90 will also be uploaded to Logbook of The World - **www.arrl.org/lotw**. For more information on W1AW, visit the W1AW Web page - **www.arrl.org/w1aw.html**.

Notes for Running the BARC Net

- Mike Ardai N1IST

First, check that the repeater is free. If there is a QSO going on, and it is a few minutes into the net, break in and gently remind them that it is net time. Note that we can't force them to leave; most will QSY to let the net go ahead. If it is a few minutes into the net and there is still no net control, jump in and pick up the net.

Make sure you have a pen and a sheet of paper. The important thing to copy down is the call; it's nice to get the name and QTH, but that will come easier later on.

For logging, make three columns on the page, one for name and call sign, one for checkmarks for those with traffic, and one for notes. Leave a blank line between entries for additional notes.

This net doesn't have any logging requirements; the logs are for your use when running the net. Other nets may require a specific log to be sent to the net manager. If you have email access and you would like to, format the logs like N1IST's regular ones and send them to barc-list.

A question was raised about what equipment you need to run the net. If you use a HT, don't move around during the net (the signal flutters). Make sure you have a spare battery handy. For a mobile rig, you will usually have a hand mike. I mounted the mike hook on my radio rack; the side of a shelf next to your table works well. Be careful with desk mikes; it is too easy to drop some papers or a book on the PTT and lock up the repeater. A boom mike with a foot switch, is a good choice.

New Morse "@" Character Is Now Official

The International Morse code officially gains a new character on May 3. That's when the now-familiar "@" symbol joins the Morse lexicon as the letters "AC" run together (.--.-). Known as the "commercial at" or "commat," the @ symbol never rose to the level of usage that demanded a unique Morse character until it gained currency as a critical component of e-mail addresses during the past decade or so.

Last December, the International Telecommunication Union Radiocommunication Sector (ITU-R) Study Group 8 agreed on the wording of a Draft New Recommendation ITU-R M.[MORSE] that specified the international Morse code character set and transmission procedures and included the new Morse code character.

The pending change has attracted some attention in the media, including mentions on National Public Radio's *All Things Considered* and in *The New York Times*.

Trying to Get Through to the FCC?

-- ARRL Letter, 26 March 2004

Forget your CORES/FRN password? It's possible to reset your CORES/FRN (Commission Registration System/FCC Registration Number) password via the FCC Web site for electronic application filing. This might come in handy if you have forgotten your password, need to change it to another password or were automatically registered for CORES through a Volunteer Examiner Coordinator and don't know your password.

Visit the secure "Forgot Your Password" web site **https://esupport.fcc.gov/password.htm** and complete all the required fields. You will need to supply your FCC Registration Number (available via ULS or through many on-line call sign servers, such as ARRL's) as well as your Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN), which is typically your Social Security number. Applicants also will need to supply name, email address and telephone number.


