A Mixed Bag

Last night, several members of your Executive Committee met with the director of the Parlin Memorial Library in Everett to donate several books about ham radio, in appreciation and gratitude for allowing us to use that site for our Business meetings for the past four years. With these books, we hope to answer some questions that young and old readers may have about "Ham Radio? What's that?" Similarly, we hope those readers will become callers and, eventually, visitors and members of BARC.

These books provide different perspectives on ham radio: from DXing and contesting to building and technical issues to conversation and public service. And when you come to think of it, all parts of this spectrum of interests blend into a continuum. Think of this...

A DXer/contester gains skill in rapid messaging, picking essential information from a crowded melee of signals. The rag chewer/public service ham also has to extract the essential information to continue a conversation or deliver a message. Both must transmit clean signals and receive accurately, requiring an understanding of technical issues inherent to the correct operation of their equipment.

The combination of skills gained in one activity enhances the ability to engage in the others.

This is the strength of BARC. We have members who are adept at all aspects of our service and hobby.

- We have DXers and contesters see our February speaker upcoming (article elsewhere) and our honored speaker in November. DXing is very much a part of BARC.
- We have rag chewers and public service people listen on the air to our club repeaters and on other frequencies, and see the lists of events we've participated in or coordinated on behalf of agencies, which required communications specialists.
- We have technical people look at the descriptions of the equipment the club maintains and participate in the conversations about topics ranging from sunspot cycles to Hamming over the Internet.

BARC offers a mixed bag of skills, abilities, and adventures. Stick your hand in and come up with some goodies!

Hams Needed For A New Public Service Event

The Boston Police and the State Police are sponsoring a half marathon and a 5K run and walk to benefit the "Kids at Risk" programs. All events run concurrently with the start and finish at the World Trade Center in South Boston. They will be held on **Sunday, 13 March**, with hams reporting at 0900.

The sponsorship is of particular interest to us since it gives hams exposure to the police departments, letting them see the communication skills we use under critical situations. Considering the short notice we were given for this new event, our prompt mobilization will also be observed.

While the final routes have not yet been authorized, the venue is expected to be in the Back Bay, downtown Boston, and Cambridge. Course aid stations, a mobile, and several shadows are expected. All stations should be closed by early afternoon (some sooner).

Committee Reports:

<u>VEC</u> At the January exam session, four candidates came and all four passed the exams that they wanted.

<u>Membership</u> Arthur, N1NHZ, said that he currently has no new candidates for membership. Bob said that renewal memberships are still coming in and that we are at the same level that we usually are at this time.

<u>Program</u> The speaker for the February General meeting will be Bill Ohm, W1OHM, who will speak about contesting and DXing.

<u>Public Service</u> Bob, WA1IDA, said that there are seven events in the upcoming year that are currently being planned. Bob also told us about a new event to be held in Boston called "Boston's Run to Remember". It will be held on Sunday, March 13, 2005 and involves a 5K run and walk and a half marathon run. The event is sponsored by the State Police and Boston Police. More information will follow when available.

<u>Repeater</u> Mike, N1IST, told us that the problem with the UHF (447.175) repeater is the power amplifier and that John, WN9T, has removed the amplifier for service. The machine is currently working with only the exciter, so the range is reduced. As soon as the repairs have been made, Mike will continue work to link the repeaters.

Old Business:

Eric, K1NUN, was unable to attend the ARRL New England Division cabinet meeting in Springfield, but Mark Duff, KB1EKN, did attend and briefed us on some of the topics that were discussed.

The donation of books to the Parlin Library took place at a brief ceremony before the Business meeting. Photos of the presentation will be sent to the local newspaper by the library staff and will also be available on the BARC website and in a later *The SPARC*.

<u>On Line Survey</u> There have been fourteen responses so far. A complete analysis has not been done, but most people seem to think that the survey is a good idea. <u>By-Law Review</u> The committee is continuing to work and has no final recommendations at this time.

<u>Brochure</u> Blake, K1BTH, has forwarded what he had to Eric who printed it out and distributed it for further comment, corrections, additions, and deletions. Hopefully some graphic/photos can be added and it will be produced sometime in the near future.

New Business:

A motion was moved, seconded and passed to buy a season pass for space at the 2005 MIT Flea Market.

<u>Field Day</u> We have the permit and confirmation for the site at Larz Anderson Park in Brookline for our use for Field Day on June 25 - 26, 2005. We still need a Chairperson and committee to do planning.

<u>Boston Marathon 2005</u> A consortium of several clubs is being formed to coordinate ham radio support for portions of the event. Eric has appointed Mark Duff, – KB1EKN, to be our representative to the consortium formation. The group will meet the week of February 7, and Mark will report the results for BARC consideration.

Blake has also received a request for BARC support for the Boston Marathon from the Boston Emergency Management Agency.

<u>Blue Hills Observatory</u> Mark, KB1EKN, told us that they would like us to have a BARC display and possibly a station on the air at their open house on Saturday April 30.

The meeting was adjourned at 2045.

BARC VE Sessions

NOTE: The ARRL Volunteer Examination Coordinator (VEC) has announced that the exam fee for 2005 will be \$14.

The Boston Amateur Radio Club holds its monthly VE session on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. Future exam dates are listed below. A map is shown on page 7 of this newsletter.

If the Brookline public schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be cancelled. Otherwise, the exams will be on the second Monday of each month.

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School Street from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: **www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif** : for more info. This map also appears on page 7 of this newsletter.

For those traveling via public transportation, take the "D" branch of the **T** Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician thru Extra, CW and written). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$14.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$14 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

Water, Water, Is It Safe To Drink?

Maybe you were not in Sri Lanka, India or Indonesia. But you could have been in one of our local communities that had a water main burst this winter. Any of a number of disasters could put questionable water in your tap. Would you know how to turn contaminated water into water safe to drink?

The American Red Cross provides this easy-to-follow plan for quick water purification:

- Filter the water using a piece of cloth or a coffee filter to remove solid particles.
- Bring it to a rolling boil for at least one full minute.
- Let it cool at least 30 minutes. Water must be cool or the chlorine treatment described below will be useless.
- ♦ Add 16 drops of chlorine bleach per gallon of water, or 8 drops per two-liter bottle of water. Stir to mix. Sodium hypochlorite in a concentration of 5.25% to 6% should be the only active ingredient in the bleach. There should not be any added soap or fragrances. A major bleach manufacturer has also added sodium hydroxide as an active ingredient, which it states does not pose a health risk for water treatment.
- Let water stand 30 minutes.
- If the water smells of chlorine, you can use it. If it does not smell of chlorine, add 16 more drops of chlorine bleach per gallon of water (or 8 drops per 2-liter bottle of water), let stand 30 minutes, and smell it again. If it smells of chlorine, you can use it. If it does not smell of chlorine, discard it and find another source of water.

If local public health information differs from this advice, the local information should prevail. Additional information may be found in the Red Cross brochure, "Food and Water in an Emergency" (A5055).


