## New Technician Class Question Pool Released To the Public

The National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators (NCVEC) Question Pool Committee (QPC) has released the new Technician (Element 2) Amateur Radio examination question pool. The new Element 2 question pool is available for viewing or download in Adobe PDF, MS Word, RTF and ASCII text format from the NCVEC Web site:

The new question pool becomes effective for all examinations administered on or after July 1, 2006, and it will remain valid until June 30, 2010. The current Element 2 question pool will expire June 30, 2006.

The new Technician pool contains 396 questions, from which 35 are selected for an Element 2 examination. This question pool contains no graphics or diagrams. The QPC requests that anyone spotting possible errors or suggesting corrections contact the Question Pool Committee via e-mail: **qpcinput@ncvec.org**. Reference the question pool (ie, Technician, General, Amateur Extra) in the subject line, and include the question number(s) involved plus a brief explanation. Forward comments and suggestions for new questions or changes in topic areas for any of the three question pools, Element 2, 3 or 4.

#### Committee reports:

<u>Exams</u>: Dick reports that at the February session, there was one candidate and he passed.

Membership Arthur reported that he had no new prospects.

Treasurer Jim reported a balance of \$3304.52.

<u>Public Service</u> Bob reports that The Run to Remember will not use hams for communication this year as they want to try commercial radios. Saturday, April 8 will be the MS Walk in Boston and also a new MS Walk from Wellesley to the Boston Common. BARC will support both events so we will need more hams this year.

The Run of the Charles canoe race will be on April 30, and the Bikes-Not-Bombs bicycle ride (three routes) will be on June 11. The Boston Marathon will be on April 17, and BARC is part of the consortium providing communications along the route. Blake encourages all BARC members to participate, if they are available.

### Old Business:

Mark reminded that the club will be participating at the Blue Hill Observatory Open House on Saturday April 29.

Frank reported that the web site for the Boxboro convention is not open yet and that as soon as it is available he will reserve the club space.

#### New Business:

It was decided that in case of bad weather on meeting days, the President or Vice President would make a decision to hold or cancel meetings by 3:00 pm, and then ensure that the decision is posted to BARC-list, and that announcements are made on our 145.230 Boston repeater.

Bob showed us an emergency preparedness kit in a backpack that he purchased at Building 19. He said that there might still be some available at the Weymouth Building 19 store.

Blake told us that there will be a drill for the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS) in June and they would like BARC to participate with communications.

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The mention of the drill brought up the subject of how to notify members of a need for operators in an emergency. There followed a discussion of how we should do this. It was suggested that there should be some type of "phone tree" notification system. Frank and Arthur will bring suggestions for a system to the next business meeting.

There was also discussion of the status and future of BERT (Boston Amateur Radio Club Emergency Response Team). Blake said that he is too busy to properly take care of BERT to ensure growth and readiness to respond. He is looking for a volunteer leader to take over this function.

There was a consensus that we would like to continue to hold future Business meetings at the Salvation Army second floor cafeteria.

There was a discussion about the ARES drill that was held on February 25 and the use of Echolink and IRLP. There were comments from several members that they found it difficult to participate on 2 meter repeaters in the Boston area as there did not seem to be an organized net. Blake encouraged everyone to send comments about the drill to him and he would forward to ARES leadership.

Bob suggested that we should have a speaker sometime soon at a General meeting about how to set up and use Echolink and IRLP.

## Radio Range Indicator – A Semitechnical Article



Many years ago in college, in a mechanical drawing class, we had to create nomograms to show how to depict a calculation in graphic form. This involved slopes, intercepts, corresponding angles, parallel lines, and a whole lot more stuff I've long since forgotten. So, when I found this nomogram in a long ago filed catalog of commercial two-way radio equipment, I had to share it with the members of the Boston Amateur Radio Club.

As you can see from the diagram on the next page and its instructions, if you place a straightedge along the correct line for your frequency, antenna altitude, power, antenna gain, and coaxial cable loss, you can determine the range of the complete "system" from the radio to the repeater (or other radio).

Of course, you can use this nomogram backwards. That is, if you want to reach a repeater on a certain band and you know how far away it is, you can determine your power level, get an indication of the quality coax cable you'll need, and how high to mount your antenna.

See? No computer required and no batteries to run down. No math, just a straightedge or ruler and it's all reduced to a simple picture.



- 1. Locate your base station antenna height on your correct transmitter power vertical column.
- 2. Find the horizontal line closest to that point.
- Step up one line for each dB of base station antenna gain and each dB of mobile antenna gain. Step down 1 line for each dB of base station coax line loss and each dB of mobile coax line loss.
- Move across to the intersection of this line and the correct vertical frequency band. The intersection is the mileage range estimate for a 1 microvolt received signal. To find the .5 microvolt range, go up 6 lines (dB's).

BEWARE: Range estimators are nothing more than estimators. They cannot account for local conditions and terrain variations. You can improve the reliability of your estimates by comparing the results with known systems in your area. Then determine what decibel corrections are needed to match these known systems and use the corrections in your future estimates.

### **BARC VE Sessions**

The Boston Amateur Radio Club usually holds monthly VE sessions on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. Future exam dates are listed below. A map is shown on page 7 of this newsletter.

If the Brookline public schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be canceled. Otherwise, the exams will be on the second Monday of each month.

For those traveling via public transportation, take the "D" branch of the  ${\bf T}$  Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

We give all exams (Technician thru Extra, CW and written). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$14.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$14 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.


