ARRL Convention in Boxboro

The ARRL New England Division Convention will be held in Boxboro, MA on 25 to 27 August. It is more than just a Hamfest with new and used Amateur Radio gear. It is a chance to go to many interesting forums and to engage socially with your fellow Amateur Radio operators. Be sure to make some time to attend the technical and operation forums as well as browse the giant flea market. All the major manufacturers and many of the smaller ones will show their latest wares.

The ARRL Forum will give you a chance to hear the developments in League support and legal issues. There will be several sessions featuring weather and emergency communication topics. A class on the basic Incident Command System (ICS) will be presented.

NIMS/ICS Training Essential for Volunteers

The Department of Homeland Security is requiring all first responders, including volunteers, to complete at least introductory training in the National Incident Management System (NIMS) by 2007. Most, if not all, non-governmental agencies will soon require the ICS-700 course for volunteers (including hams) to participate in their activities.

This sounds formidable, but in reality there is an Independent Study course available from FEMA designated IS-700. Go to **www.training.fema.gov/emiweb/is/crslist.asp** to find the course list. Follow directions and you will get to IS-700. You can take the course on line or download the material and do it at your own pace. It shouldn't take more than three hours. There's a final exam on line, but it isn't going to cause much sweat (or cost any money – the courses are all free). After passing the final, the student will get notification by e-mail or regular mail.

NIMS incorporates the Incident Command System (ICS), and adds the component "Multiagency Coordination Systems," a combination of facilities, equipment, personnel, procedures, and communications integrated into a common framework for coordinating and supporting incident management.

Also, look at the rest of the course offerings on the FEMA training Web site. They represent a wealth of knowledge, organized so that we can get through them and actually learn something. They aren't rocket science, just good stuff we need to know! See also courses IS-100, and IS-200.

The ARRL and BARC strongly recommend that hams take these courses. Even if you do not anticipate participating in emergency or public service activities, you will have a better understanding of what is going on when a disaster hits.

Hams Needed for the 2006 Boston Triathlon

After five years of successful events, the Boston Triathlon now takes its place as a "Boston Tradition." Ham radio has established its community value at times like these. We have been asked again to support safety communications. With a little fine tuning, including many ideas from hams, the event is expected to be even better than last year.

For those who have done this event before, you know the road conditions still call for our best support for the athletes. We need you again, and the Race Director has asked for even more ham help (that's what happens when we are appreciated).

If you are new to ham public service (or don't have much familiarity with it), this is the way to become familiar without much pressure. For hams, this is an easy introduction and an appreciated community service.

The triathlon consists of a swim in the harbor around the World Trade Center (WTC) in South Boston; bike from there through downtown Boston, Charlestown, across and around Cambridge, and back to the WTC; and run from the WTC into and around the Marine Industrial Park, and finish at the WTC. Exhausting? Yes for the racers. No for us hams.

Date: Sunday, 3 September 2006

Ham start: 0600

Ham finish: 0930 to 1100

The ham start time is governed by road closures and access to the station locations. It is important to be at the assigned locations on time (even if you are the first one there) - the triathletes move very fast (I don't know how they do it), so the course is occupied quickly.

Yes, I know it is the day before Labor Day. The upside is it starts early and ends early, leaving plenty of time to enjoy the long weekend. Your help is greatly needed to continue this as a superb event and to uphold our reputation for dependable support. Our assignments consist of monitoring hazardous and critical locations along the course, and the medical/support stations. As we did last year, we plan to use a 2-meter repeater and/or a 70-cm repeater. Hand-held with a good battery and an antenna better than a "rubber duck" is the way to go.

If you can help, please contact me as soon as possible. I will email the assignments and more detail as soon as they are available. For most assignments, you can go directly to your station.

Time is short, so please let me know quickly if you can help. Please send me a phone number (cell, also). Parking should be available very close to each assignment. Feel free to contact me if you have any questions.

Minutes of the Boston Amateur Radio Club Business Meeting

The meeting began informally at 1915 at the Parlin Library in Everett. Due to illness and other commitments, the President, Vice President and Secretary were absent. Those attending:

As the BARC delegate, Bob reviewed topics discussed at the ARRL New England Division Cabinet meeting held in Portland ME on 16 July. Of note was the slow decline in the number of hams in New England and in the country.

The ARRL online Technician course (reported to be excellent) cost has been reduced and includes a one-year membership in the League.

Frustration was expressed regarding the use of the word "Amateur" when presented to served agencies and other outsiders. It connotes the opposite of the professionalism of our communication support.

Suggestions were offered to broaden the definition of ham radio to include SWL, experimenters and other skills.

While not a problem in most parts of New England, significant conflicts between ARES and RACES should be resolved for the benefit of all. This may require changes in both the FCC Regulations and the ARRL.

The perennial BARC discussion about a club station and a permanent meeting place resulted in no conclusion. There was further consideration of the goals of the club and how better to support the ham community.

The next public service event is the Boston Triathlon on Sunday, 3 September. Ham volunteers are needed. Now in its sixth year, it has become a Boston tradition, thanks in no small part to ham support.

The connection between meeting presentations and meeting attendance was examined. While other factors influence attendance, certain speakers and topics clearly motivate members to attend meetings.

An informal adjournment occurred at 2045 when the Library closed.

The Business meeting is where the real business of BARC is conducted. If you have any suggestions, questions or comments,

this is where to bring them. All members are welcome (and encouraged) to attend these meetings.

Notice - Are You Using VoIP? Beware!

Many people are aware of "phishing," (pronounced: fish-ing) in which email recipients are directed to a fake website seeking their financial details but might not know about a new Internet scam called "vishing," which is short for "voice phishing." Vishing uses Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) phones instead of a bogus web link to steal financial information.

A recent incident involved customers from Santa Barbara Bank and Trust in CA. Internet con artists sent account holders emails asking them to telephone the bank. Customers who responded heard a recorded message asking them to enter their account details. A second incident earlier this month involved Paypal customers.

VoIP service providers allow their customers to pick a telephone number that appears to be based elsewhere, so it's possible for fraudsters to pick a phone number in the same area code and prefix of a major bank despite being physically located somewhere hundreds of miles away in another city or state.

Always remember that a financial institution already has your personal information, so if you get an unsolicited telephone call where someone is asking you to provide or confirm any of your personal information, immediately hang up and call your financial institution.

Derecho Hits New England

NWS determined that the extensive damage that occurred on Wednesday, 2 August 2006 was caused by what is termed a "derecho." A derecho is a long-lived, widespread and rapidly moving convective windstorm that essentially is comprised of a family of downburst clusters. Downbursts can be either microbursts or macrobursts, depending on whether the damage swath is less than or greater than 2.5 miles.

The result of this family of downburst clusters is widespread straight-line wind damage over a large area. The winds associated with derechos are not constant and may vary considerably along its path - sometimes being below severe limits (57 mph or less) and sometimes being very strong (greater than 100 mph in extreme derechos).

The word derecho was coined by Dr. Gustavus Hinrichs, a physics professor at the University of Iowa, in a paper published in the American Meteorological Journal in 1888. Dr. Hinrichs chose this terminology for thunderstorm-induced straight-line winds as opposed to the word tornado. Derecho is a Spanish word which can be defined as "direct" or "straight ahead" while

tornado is thought by some, including Dr. Hinrichs, to have been derived from the Spanish word "tornar" which means "to turn."

The modern-day strict definition of a derecho requires that its length be greater than 240 miles...however the storm prediction center acknowledges that true derechos can be somewhat shorter in length.

Are You Vacationing in the Wilderness this Summer?

The Wilderness protocol (see *QST*, August 1995, page 101) calls for wilderness hams to announce their presence on, and to monitor, the national calling frequencies for five minutes beginning at the top of the hour, every three hours from 0700 to 1900 while in the back country.

A ham in a remote location may be able to relay emergency information through another wilderness ham who has better access to a repeater. The calling frequencies are: 52.525, 146.520, 223.500, 446.000, 1294.500 MHz.


Think of the great weather now, and how it is just right for putting up another, bigger, better antenna.
