BARC Is Moving to a New Meeting Location

BARC is moving to a new location for Business and General meetings, beginning with the October General meeting. The BARC Management Team supports this change for the following reasons, and we are sure you will understand how this benefits the club.

The move is for the club's benefit to go where many members are located. We anticipate seeing some people whom we haven't seen in a long time. This is the *club's* move. The benefit is bound up with the location that offers casual dining, extended hours, easy parking, and even some after-meeting meeting places. We have been most fortunate to have been the beneficiaries of The Salvation Army's generosity for several years, and we acknowledge Bill Foley, KB1GLF, who remained in the building after his regular day job to supervise the building and lock up at the end of our meetings.

We have known for a long time that our Boston location was temporary and we have been looking for a new meeting site. We explored restaurants, businesses, hotels, and more. There has always been a reason to reject a place, so we have had to become more flexible.

Our new meeting location is in the Community Room, off the main lobby at the Newton Police Headquarters, 1321 Washington St, West Newton, MA (maps on page 7 of this newsletter). It provides new benefits for BARC and its members.

We owe a profound thank you to club member Howard Mintz, WA1CFX, who is an officer in the NPD for reserving the room for us. Here are some of the benefits to BARC:

• **Location:** Right on Washington St (Rt 16), convenient to public transportation from Boston and along the Mass Pike, and near I-95 (Rt 128). This location is accessible to a wider geography than the Boston location, thus benefiting more hams and potential hams in the area, and bringing a club to where there is no active club at present.

• Accessibility: Being a public building, accessibility is a requirement. Of course, once a facility is made accessible to those for whom it is a necessity, it becomes more accessible and convenient to all. For drivers, there is adequate on-street parking and several open lots nearby.

• Amenities: This site, in the West Newton section of the City of Newton, offers several restaurants from modest to upscale, ethnic and ordinary - all within walking distance (that is, within two blocks). This is a convenience for those who come early to the meetings, as well as providing after-meeting venues to continue discussions and general conversation. Further, the NPD room itself is available to us to continue right there without the need to scatter at a predetermined time. (There are thoughts that we may expect refreshments at meetings.)

• Service area: The Middlesex ARC had met in Newton, but its activity has slipped in recent years and has not grown. Some of its members still live in the vicinity. BARC attracted some of them, but our Boston location was not convenient and we hope that our arrival in Newton will revive their activity and interest. Furthermore, there are active and quiet hams in and around Newton who may want to join BARC and participate in our activities. We are not in competition with other suburban ham clubs and we support them and their programs just as we expect them to support us. There are good reasons for belonging to and participating in more than one Amateur Radio club!

So, what does this really mean *for our club* once the advantages are spelled out? The club needs a new location that supports preand post-meeting get-togethers. It needs a place we can kibbitz without rushing in to Boston for a too-short meeting. It needs a location where its members can meet leisurely and linger. BARC has needed a move for a long time, and we have done it.

Thank you again to The Salvation Army and the Newton Police Department.

The Boston Amateur Radio Club usually holds monthly VE sessions on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. A map is shown on page 7.

If the Brookline public schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be canceled.

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School Street from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif : for more info.

For those traveling via the **T**, take the "D" branch of the Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician thru Extra, CW and written). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- **\$14.00** (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$14 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.




