What? A Radio With No Buttons or Dials?

It's all on the screen. Come see what the future of ham radio holds. Software-defined radio (SDR) lets you use generic hardware with a computer sound card and special software to make a very powerful radio. This concept is presently used in everything from cell phones to satellites, and is the hottest new thing in the ham radio world. The software, called Digital Signal Processing (DSP), is available.

Mike Ardai, N1IST, will introduce us to the techniques and practice of SRD at the BARC November General meeting on **Thursday, 16 November**. This is a presentation you won't want to miss because it represents the future direction of ham radio.

The purpose is to thank the thousands of Spotters whose timely severe weather reports protect life and property.

BARC will participate by setting up a station at the Blue Hill Observatory (BHO) in Milton as we have done for the past three years. This weather station holds the oldest continuous weather records in the nation. Our call sign will be W1BOS/MQE. The call "MQE" was the original designation for the weather station.

All members and guests, including children, are invited to attend and may participate in this fun and instructive event. Our limited operating time is only on **Saturday, 2 December**, from 1000 to 1600. Tours of the weather station are available. The elevation is over 600 feet above MSL and provides excellent coverage on many bands. On a clear day the view is superb – extending over 100 miles.

CW frequencies include code practices, Qualifying Runs and CW bulletins.

RTTY = Teleprinter Bulletins = BAUDOT (45.45 Baud) and AMTOR-FEC (100 Baud). ASCII (110 Baud) is sent only as time allows.

Code practice texts are from *QST*, and the source of each practice is given at the beginning of each practice and at the beginning of alternate speeds.

On Tuesdays and Fridays at 2330 UTC, Keplerian Elements for active amateur satellites are sent on the regular teleprinter frequencies.

A DX bulletin replaces or is added to the regular bulletins between 0100 UTC Thursdays and 0100 UTC Fridays.

In a communications emergency, monitor W1AW for special bulletins as follows: Voice on the hour, Teleprinter at 15 minutes past the hour, and CW on the half-hour.

FCC licensed amateurs may operate the station from 1500 UTC to 1700 UTC, and then from 1800 UTC to 2045 UTC, Monday through Friday. The station is closed 1700 to 1800 UTC. Be sure to bring your current FCC amateur license or a photocopy.

Sixth Annual Half Marathon - Run and Done

ARRL Again Participating in the "Combined Federal Campaign"

For the fifth year running, the US Office of Personnel Management has designated the ARRL as a participant in the 2006 Combined Federal Campaign (CFC). In the past, this campaign for federal civilian and military employees, and Postal Service workers has generated more than \$69,000 for ARRL programs. The CFC provides an easy way to support ARRL's efforts to represent its members and all radio amateurs.

Similar to the United Way, the CFC encourages individuals to pledge by payroll deduction to non-profit organizations of their choice. The ARRL encourages eligible radio amateurs to consider the League when designating campaign recipients. Those wishing to select the ARRL to receive all or part of their payroll deduction should designate CFC 9872 when completing their CFC donor forms.

Donations to ARRL can be designated for Diamond Club contributions, the ARRL Spectrum Defense Fund or the ARRL

Education & Technology Program. Donors may also make unrestricted contributions to the League. The ARRL Development Office <mhobart@arrrl.org> would appreciate a copy of the donor form to ensure that each contribution is applied according to the donor's wishes and the contribution or pledge can be properly acknowledged. The 2006 CFC ends December 15.

BARC VE Sessions

The Boston Amateur Radio Club usually holds monthly VE sessions on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. A map is shown on page 7.

If the Brookline public schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be canceled.

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School Street from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif : for more info.

For those traveling via the T, take the "D" branch of the Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician thru Extra, CW and written). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- **\$14.00** (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Note that code tests are no longer free. Those taking the code test only will also have to pay the \$14 fee. Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

NIMS/ICS Training Needed for Ham Volunteers

The Department of Homeland Security is requiring all first responders, including volunteers, to complete at least introductory training in the National Incident Management System (NIMS) by 2007. Most, if not all, non-governmental agencies will soon require the ICS-700 course for volunteers (including hams) to participate in their activities. This sounds formidable, but in reality there is an Independent Study course from FEMA that provides what you need. The course is IS-700. Go to:

www.training.fema.gov/emiweb/is/crslist.asp

and find the course list. Follow directions and you will get to IS-700. You can take the course on line or download the material and do it at your own pace. It shouldn't take more than three hours. There's a final exam on line, but it isn't going to cause much sweat (or cost any money – the courses are all free). After passing the final, the student will be notified.

NIMS incorporates the Incident Command System (ICS), and adds the component "Multiagency Coordination Systems," a combination of facilities, equipment, personnel, procedures, and communications integrated into a common framework for coordinating and supporting incident management.

Also, look at the rest of the course offerings on the FEMA training Web site. They represent a wealth of knowledge, organized so that we can get through them and actually learn something. They aren't rocket science, just good stuff we need to know!

The ARRL and BARC strongly recommend that hams take these courses. Even if you do not anticipate participating in emergency or public service activities, you will have a better understanding of what is going on when a disaster hits.






