20 Years Ago in The SPARC – Joe Chapman, NV1W

The topic of the June, 1998, general meeting was Elections! — President Mike Ardai, N1IST, made a plea for more participation at Field Day — Bob Salow, WA1IDA, provided a recap of the 1998 Assisted Technology Conference — Bruce Piggott. KC1US, provided a recap of the 1998 Walk for Hunger — Bob Wondolowski, N1KDA, related the saga of his antenna — Senator Barry Goldwater, K7UGA (SK) was remembered — And elsewhere, the TV sitcom "Sex and the City" premiered on HBO.

Who the Heck Was Roger? - Harris Pitnof, WA1GXC

Our electronic and wired society is rich with urban mythology and apocryphal stories. Take a stroll down Wikipediamemory lane and you will have access to a rich trove of fantastic stories (All true, or they couldn't be published on the InterWeb) that will enlighten and engender wonder. "History" has it that the term "Bug" for a computer problem, came about in 1947 when a brilliant Navy engineer found a moth stuck between relay contacts, fouling up the works. Taped the offending insect to accompany a note in the laboratory log to document the incident. Nice touch. Dig a little deeper in your research, however, and you can read in the 1901 edition of G. M. Dodge's *The Telegraph Instructor* the following phrase and definition: "Bug-in-the wire" — "Slang phrase frequently used when a wire is in trouble".

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Much of our Amateur procedure comes handed-down to us from landline-Morse railroad telegraphy over 130 years ago, filtered through military and maritime radio, and finally winding up on our doorstep with the original meaning or intent long-ago lost. For those of you without a lot of familiarity with on-the-air CW (International Morse or Continental Code), keep in mind that the Code is a language of sound; as you read the following details, note that it is the sound, not the graphic representation on paper, that is the key. (Sorry for the pun)

In amateur, military, and maritime training publications and authoritative manuals, we represent the sound of some procedural signs (prosigns) by depicting letters with a bar drawn over them, commanding the operator to run the letters together for a unique sound. Thus, \overline{AR} universally signifies "END OF MESSAGE". Why? Dit-Dah-Dit Dah-Dit was American Landline Morse for F N — "Finish". Today's International code does not exactly correspond with old Morse in every respect; same sound, different letters.

We refer to an old, dead Ham as a "Silent Key", a SK. (Good news— if you're still reading this, you need not worry) That's kinda a double play-on-words, because SK is the operating signal for "End-of-work". But dit-dit-dit-dah-dit-dah doesn't stand for "silent key" or "stop keying" — it is the same sound as American landline Morse for Signal "30" from the Phillips Code and the Western Union "92 Code" of operating signals — Dit-dit-dit-dah-dit (3) Daaaah

(long dash: "0") - 30 - "End of work". By the way, in modern International Telecommunications Union (ITU) publications and ARRL handbooks through the early 50's, the prosign is represented as \overline{VA} - same sound.

The World War II Joint Army-Navy phonetic alphabet differs almost completely from the Int'l Civil Aviation Organization alphabet in modern widespread use by hams, military forces of many nations, and aviation domestic and worldwide. The ICAO phonetics were selected by a U.N. working group of linguists to be understandable and unambiguous in voice communications for speakers of almost all modern languages. Even the spellings are precise and purposeful — A is not Alpha, but Alfa; Juliett, not Juliet. A German or French speaker would pronounce Alpha as "Alp-Ha", not Alfa. And Q is properly endered with the French pronunciation "Keh-Bec", not "Kwe-Bec". Although today's voice equivalent of "R" for Received should be "Romeo", it's not. So from the oceans and battlefields of 1942 — "Peter, Queen, ROGER, Sugar, Tare". ROGER it is, today and forever, on the air and in the air, all over the world.

Referencing Mr. Dodge again: "Ham — (see Plug)" "Plug — An operator who is not proficient".

Minutes of the June, 2018, Business Meeting-Joe Chapman, NV1W

A Business Meeting of the Boston Amateur Radio Club was held on Thursday, June 7, 2018, at Brookline Police Headquarters in Brookline. Members attending: KB1EKN, KB1ISG, KO4W, N1QD, NA1I, NV1W, W1JJF, WA1IDA. The meeting was called to order by President Joe Harris, N1QD, at 7:37 p.m.

Officer reports. President: no report. Vice President: no report. Treasurer: we have \$2,831.19 in the checking account and \$1851.17 in the savings account. Secretary: we had a good renewal rate for 2018, with only a handful of members not renewing.

Committee reports. Public service: Bob, WA1IDA, gave a cummary of the Run of the Charles and the remaining upcoming events for the year.

Repeater: we have changed out cables, added new hardline, and rack mounted the VHF repeater. The VHF isolator seems to have knocked out the noise on the output frequency. Users on the VHF repeater report problems during windy conditions, which leads us to surmise there is a physical problem with the antenna. We will be installing a high-quality Comprod antenna that we were able to obtain at cost sometime in July. The DMR UHF repeater is fine, with no problems reported in over a year.

Nominating committee: Linda, NA1I, reported that the committee offers the following slate: Vice President: Mark Duff, KB1EKN; Treasurer, Jim Clogher, N1ICN, and Secretary, Joe Chapman, NV1W. The committee was unable to find a candidate for President. A discussion was held about how to operate without a president. We also discussed the problem of low attendance at meetings.

Old business. Jim, N1ICN, will give the 501(c)(3) as well as the Massachusetts Sales and Use Tax Exemption paperwork to Kinda, NA1I, who will determine what needs to be done over the summer and do it.

For Field Day, we purchased a 38-foot fiberglass Max-Gain mast and guy kit for the 20/15/10 meter beam antenna. Total cost was \$264.60 including shipping. This mast will be used at this year's Field Day.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

Jump Kit Adapter and Cable List - Mike Ardai, N1IST

[Excerpted from the President's Message in the June, 1998, issue of The SPARC. These days I think PowerPoles might be a better standard power connector than Molex, and the parts will certainly cost more than ten bucks. —NV1W]

[Recent BARC public service events and drills included] Aviation Expo, the Assistive Technology fair, the Chelsea fire, and the hurricane and airplane crash drills. Not only does this help the community, but also it helps publicize BARC and ham radio. As we have discovered at so many of these events, we are often called in to operate in some agencies' facility or vehicle. Often, these have ham antennas already installed, but many people couldn't take advantage of them because they didn't have the right adapters with them. Please take this time to gather up the following adapters and keep them in your jump kit:

- Cigarette lighter to standard Molex (fused) gator clips to Molex (fused)
- Banana plugs to Molex (fused) we just rented a U-Haul that had binding posts on the dash
- Molex to radio DC power whatever your radio needs to run on 12V
- Short coax with PL-259 connectors on each end
- Short coax with male BNC connectors on each end
- SO-239 to male BNC adapter connects PL259 cables to HT antenna jacks
- Female BNC to PL-259 adapter connects HT magmounts to mobile rigs

Total cost of this stuff is under \$10, much less if you scrounge bits, and it will save lots of hassles when trying to set up an emergency station.

- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- \$15.00 (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
