

Field Day Recap - Joe Harris, N1QD

Early on a Saturday morning, members and friends of the Boston Amateur Radio Club and the Harvard Wireless Club descended on the Bare Cove Fire Museum in Hingham. There were antennas to assemble, ropes to string into trees, a mast to erect, and four stations to get on the air. By lunchtime, there was a triband Yagi up 25 feet on the bluff behind the building, and there were wire antennas strung up for 15, 40, 80, and 6 meters. The stations were built, the computers were networked. All was ready for the bell at 2PM!

Over the next 24 hours, there were 1200+ QSOs made on all bands from 80–6 meters, using phone, CW, and digital modes. CW made up the bulk of the contacts, outpacing phone at a pace about 1.5:1. Digital made up about 4% of the total. As it has in years past, 40 meters was also the band with the most action, contributing almost 40% of all QSOs. 80 and 20 were also good sources of QSOs. 15 was a surprising contributor, an impressive early run of over 100 phone QSOs just after the event started. 10 never really opened much, but the team still managed to pull out 20 CW contacts.

Beyond the QSO points the group earned many bonus points over the weekend. Highlights included running 100% emergency power, making 5 QSOs using solar power, copying the ARRL bulletin, and sending NTS traffic. See the score summary for a full list of all points claimed.

Minutes of the September, 2018, Business Meeting - Joe Chapman, NV1W

The Boston Amateur Radio Club held its quarterly Business Meeting on Thursday, September 6, at Brookline Police Headquarters in Brookline. Members attending: KB1EKN, KB1`ISG, N1ICN, NA1I, NV1W, WA1IDA. The meeting was called to order by Vice President Mark Duff, KB1EKN, at 7:32 p.m.

Officer reports: Mark, KB1EKN, reported that we are looking to go to the repeater site sometime in the next month to replace the VHF antenna. Jim, N1ICN, reported that we have \$1851.00 in the Repeater Fund and \$3001.92 in the checking account. Joe, NV1W, noted that we have a balance of nearly \$800 in the PayPal account that we need to work with Mike, N1IST, on getting.

A discussion was held on the topic of meetings. We determined that the bylaws do not mandate separate Business Meetings and agreed by consensus to merge the quarterly Business Meetings with General Meetings four times a year. The President or presiding officer is encouraged to keep the business portion of these combined meetings to one-half hour. We also discussed problems with the Jamaica Plain location used for some meetings in the winter and will consider dropping the General Meeting in February due to the potential for bad weather and parking difficulties.

Joe, NV1W, agreed to draw up a Bylaws amendment reducing the number of mandated meetings to give us more flexibility with scheduling.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:14 p.m.
