The website has gotten some upgrades in the last month. One of the things I wanted to enhance when I joined the club was work on BARC's social media. These days people connect by social media. So if BARC is to exist in modern America we needed to improve this.

While the website might look largely the same, a lot of work has been done in the background. We upgraded the program the website runs on to the current version. This allowed us to put more functionality in. Probably the best change we made was that, now when a post is made to the website, it is automatically put on both

We also started taking advantage of the club's non-profit status. This allowed us to get a security encryption certificate for the website. What Did You Miss at the July 2020 General Meeting? - Doc Kinne, KE1ML

A Meeting of the Boston Amateur Radio Club was held on Thursday, July 16, on the Zoom teleconferencing platform. Many thanks to Phil Temples, K9HI, for facilitating that!

For the first time in a long time, BARC had a speaker at one of their meetings. Charles Bures, WA3ITR, gave a very detailed presentation on WSPR – the Weak Signal Propagation Reporter. The last time I was active on HF this mode didn't even exist, so from a personal standpoint, this was a very educational presentation. While WSPR seems to be mainly used on HF for propagation studies, I asked if there was any reason why it couldn't be used, or wasn't being used, on the VHF and UHF bands. There is no reason I could think of that it couldn't be, and Charles confirmed this.

The July Zoom meeting attracted nearly 20 people, including a couple of folks that haven't been to a meeting in years and some for whom it is now geographically impossible. Even after COVID is over, we're trying to see if a Zoom portion of the meeting might continue as part of our physical meetings. Many organizations are seeing an increase in attendance in their meetings because Zoom eliminates the geographical barrier and are looking to integrate Zoom meetings into their regular, physical meetings. We'll see how this plays out.

- · Valid picture ID or two valid non-picture IDs
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- **\$15.00** (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
